MORE SMALLPOX : A Bathurst despatch of 4th inst., says :- Smallpox has broken out at three different places in Gloucester county-at Shippegan, St. Joseph's and Luger. At Shippegan, 65 miles from here. there are ten cases; there are several cases at St. Joseph's, near Grand Anse, and at Luger, ten miles from Bathurst, there are four cases all in one house. The health authorities claim that the infection comes from lumber camps in the province of Quebec. The provincial authorities and county board of health are using the most stringent measures to stamp the disease out.

Halifax, Feb. 10. - The Government steamer Minto is frozen in at Pictou. That is, she cannot get outside the harbor on account of the very heavy Gulf ice which has come down from the north and has established a regular blockade.

Friday there was a big storm on. As there were about one hundred passengers for the Island, the captain decided to wait until Saturday, when he made an attempt. The steamer proceeded about three miles beyond the lighthouse, but could go no further. She then returned to the wharf at Pictou and many of the passengers took train for Cape Tormentine in order to secure passage to the Island by wasking across the Straits, a distance of eight miles.

Of the one hundred odd passengers at Picton awaiting the sairing of the Minto are several who are summoned home on account of the death or sickness of relatives.

To the Honorable Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Northumberland. The undersigned, John Menzies, inspector under the Canada Temperance Act in and for the County of Northumberland begs leave to submit his report for the year ending the 31st day of December, A.D 1902, as

During the year thirty-eight prosecutions were instituted which resulted in thirty convictions, for fines amounting to \$1600 and costs \$383 05. 
