Chatham Town Council.

A special meeting of Chatham Town Council was held on Monday evening of last week—30th March—for the purpose of considering the subject of raising, by bonds or otherwise, the establishing of a furniture factory in the town.

His Worship, Mayor Snowball, who had been absent in Great Britain for some time, said he had just learned the meeting's object. He believed the matter was promoted chiefly by Mr. Murdoch, and in order that all might understand what was proposed he would suggest an adjournment of ten minutes.

Adjourned accordingly, on motion of Mr. Maher.

On resuming Mr. Murdoch said he was, with others, appointed on a Chatham Board of Trade Committee to make enquiries as to what could be done towards having small factories established in the town.

They had found a gentleman who would put up \$20,000 as stock in a furniture manufacturing company, of which he would be manager, and this in its varied departments.

The gentleman referred to, Mr. Murdoch said, was a practical man—a sterner in the line stated, having made furniture for the English and Canadian markets; he was, at the present time, the manager of one of the largest factories of this class in the west.

Mr. Murdoch said that the conditions here for such a factory were most favorable; he had the raw material in abundance; shipping facilities by water and rail, and men of a class who would readily adapt themselves to such employment.

It was also voted that every person holding two or more shares of the capital stock, and having paid all calls thereon, should be eligible for election as directors.

The shareholders nominated by the committee appointed at last week's meeting were duly chosen by ballot as directors and declared elected, as above named.

The matter of having a "Queen's Birthday" race on the Association's track was discussed, and it was unanimously expressed opinion that the track, having yet to be fenced and some draining done, the opening race could not be successfully held at so early a date.

It was finally voted that the time of holding the first race should be determined by the directors.

A meeting of the newly-elected directors was held immediately after the adjournment of the Stockholders' meeting, at which Mr. W. B. Snowball was chosen as president, Mr. J. D. Creighton, vice-president and Mr. Andrew Marquis, treasurer. The secretaryship is in abeyance, Mr. G. O. Watt being the choice of the board.

Regular Monthly Meeting of Town Council. The Town Council met in regular monthly session Monday evening, 6th inst.

In the absence of the Mayor, Mr. Murdoch was chosen chairman.

A communication was read from Hon. Provincial Secretary Tassell on the subject of fines, forfeitures and penalties under the Canada Temperance Act, referring to a report thereon of his made to and a discussion by the Executive Government.

The report was, in effect, that the fines, etc., were payable to the Receiver General, to be expended in the enforcement of the Act, and his decision was that they might be made payable by the police authority imposing them to the treasurers of cities, towns or municipalities to be used for that purpose.

The clerk read Mr. J. L. Stewart's offer to print the town accounts at 65¢ per page, accepted.

Ald. Maher read a petition in favor of placing a light on Warren Avenue. Referred to the Electric Light Committee with power to act, after a motion by Ald. Maher to immediately grant the request was voted down.

The chairman read petition of R. D. Stinson, who is in his 60th year, claiming that he had been illegally paying poll tax for four years and should be relieved of same. Referred to Finance Committee.

Ald. Hocken said he agreed with the proposition submitted, but the \$15,000 valuation required a little further explanation. How long was it proposed to keep it at that?

Ald. Murdoch: Twenty years. Ald. Maher: But, what about improvements after the thing is established for work? [There was no reply to this query.—Reporter.]

Ald. Murray referred to the desirability of Chatham encouraging a departure from its heretofore almost sole business of manufacturing deals, and was in favor of Mr. Murdoch's proposition and agreed that it would open new industrial opportunities for the boys of the town and country districts as well. All citizens of Chatham should take an intelligent part in considering the propositions to be submitted to them in connection with the matter, and be ready to see that safeguards were placed around their interests.

He referred, indirectly, to his experiences of the past in which the town had made some sacrifices from which benefits had accrued to others, and the industry afterwards abandoned. Let all see that the town was safeguarded when it made the proposed loan.

Ald. Nicol said it was as little as the Council could do, to bring the matter before the ratepayers of the town for their consideration and action. Those who were in all its bearings, before the public meeting of ratepayers proposed by the resolution.

Ald. Nicol proceeded to develop the idea that it would be preferable and more satisfactory if, instead of a public meeting, a public meeting of ratepayers in the way now prescribed for securing legislative authority for issuing Chatham debentures, an act could be secured at the present session to authorize further debentures (including this \$20,000), to be issued only when voted for by ballot of ratepayers in a similar manner as for the election of members of Council.

He referred to the present indebtedness of the town, \$260,000, and said the way he suggested would be preferable to having the ratepayers jump at the proposition in the excitement of a public meeting. The proposed loan would involve the payment of \$8,400 in the twenty years—\$800 for the first year and in lessening amounts each subsequent year of the twenty. He was not opposed to the scheme, but desired that opportunity should be given to the ratepayers to fall and deliberately consider it. If we wanted these industries we must do as is being done all over the country—participate in the west. A paid up stock of \$50,000 invested in the proposed factory would give ample security for the \$20,000 loan from the town. It is true that this first mortgage of the town might have a deterrent effect on those from whom stock subscriptions might be sought. It was generally the experience that on certain like this found that they required more capital than they started with, so this would, probably, have to borrow money. Would the banks feel like loaning in view of the town's first mortgage? However, we should not discount the future, but feel like going ahead with the project.

Mayor Snowball said he was in full accord with the resolution and would like to see more establishments like that proposed to be engaged in utilizing the small lumber, the much of which was being sent out of the country. As to safeguards to the town's interests in the proposed loan it would be important to see that they were fully provided. It would be necessary to know that the proposed capital was all subscribed and paid up; that the buildings to be provided fully represented the value placed on them; that a clause be inserted in the arrangement for the loan for the insurance of the property held as security so long as the loan was unpaid, etc. These provisions should be thought out by those who were to place the matter before the proposed meeting of ratepayers, so that they might be embodied in the resolutions to be presented and in the proposed legislation on the subject. He hoped the members of the Board of Trade and the aid men who had taken an interest in the subject would attend the ratepayers' meeting and be prepared to present the advantages of the proposed undertaking and the terms on which the town's loan was to be made and protected. It would be a cumbersome proceeding to take a ballot at a public meeting. For his part he thought our people would be trusted to come to a right decision and, as one of the ratepayers, was quite ready to abide by any decision they would arrive at in a public meeting.

The motion was then put and carried unanimously.
