The Big Game Season.

The big game season which closed on Wednesday, has been by long odds the most successful in the history of the province: The exact number of moose killed is not known, but those qualified to judge say it is somewhere in the vicinity of four hundred. It is safe to say that the number taken by non-resident sportsmen alone, was in excess of two hundred, and they got some exceptionally fine heads. The number of caribou, deer and bear killed during the season is also said to have been larger than in former years. As no record is kept of the big game killed in the province, it is impossible to get at the exact figures. The receipts from the sale of game licenses will be close to \$11,000, which is nearly \$2 000 greater than last year. - Herald
