The bull especially abolishes the period of 10 days, formerly required to elapse after the Pope's decease before the Sacred College could assemble

A quorum is to be regarded as formed by one-half of the living members of the Sacred College, plus one cardinal; and, of this body, a two-thirds majority is necessary to elect. According to the new rules, the cardinals are forbidden to put themselves in any communication with the Italian government during the interregoum. At much length, the Cardinals and the Cardinal-Chamberlain are cautioned against any recognition what ever of the Italian monarchy.

It is true that anxiety exists throughout the Christian world as to the attitude that the Italian government might assume. The real safety of the Church in Rome exists because of the divided political condition of the country and the constant watchfulness that the monarchy is compelled to exercise to maintain its own supremacy.

The new rules make it almost certain that no card nal of a foreign country has the remotest chance of election to the Papal throne. A prejudice exists among the Italian morety of the Sacred College against a foreign Pope. The atmost expedition will probably be used in assembling the Sacred

The ceremony by which a Pope is chosen is theoretically very simple. A caucus not only forbidden, but is unknown. Each Cardinal is expected to derive his instructions direct from the Almighty.
