Previous to going he was recommended to go to the Chatham hospital, but laughed at the operation performed there was entirely successful, thus saving to that man a considerable sum of money. As to the income of the institution, that was very small. surprising small. As a Chatham councillor he hoped it would not be thought that he was talking for something for Chatham, for such was not the case, he thought the institution deserving of a grant. As regards the ratepayers he doubted if there would be any kick from them for passing this small


