AFTERNOON. Coun. Flett said if Mr. Watt could convince him that any amount is due the Con. tingent fund he would agree to its being paid. The way he looked at it was this: The council when it ordered the smallpox bills to be paid intended payment to be made from the contingent fund, or else a special assessment for it on the health district would have been ordered. It was not exactly fair that the towns should help to pay these amounts and pay all the cost of their own smallpox cases, and he was willing to reimburse the towns a certain amount. He would not agree to pay the full amount, but would pay back

Coun. Morrison said Mr. Flett didn't pretend to say that the smallpox charges should be charged to the contingent fund. He wanted nothing for Newcastle to which it was not morally and legally entited. A health account should have been opened in the first place and all the smallp x payments charged to it. They might as well charge the Scott Act expense to the contingent fund. The Sec. Treasurer has borrowed the money from the contingent fund for the time, and it had not been Coun.
