A New York despatch of Sunday says: Safe and sound after a rather rough passage from Quebec, Scotland, of sixteen days and twenty-two hours, Sir Thomas Lyton's latest challenger for the America's Cup, the Shamrock III, is now lying at anchor off Tompkinsville, Staten Island, where she arrived at 10:20 this morning in company with the steam yacht Erin which had towed her with the way across the Atlantic, and the Shamrock I, towed by the British tug Cruiser. The 156 men who manned the yachts and their conveyances are all well and there were no accidents to mar the passage.

His greatest ambition had been to visit foreign countries, but he had no money. It occurred to him to take a large box with a double bottom. After six months' work, he contrived one that could be opened and shut by secret springs. When the box was done he found a travelling companion who was willing for a small sum to take charge of the box and forward it to destinations as directed. Terkal placed himself in the box, and at a convenient place on the way left it. He then marched to the railway office, proved that his box was ninety-three pounds lighter than it was when shipped, and demanded damages. This scheme was worked from place to place, the railroad and steamboat companies in most cases being only too glad to settle quietly. Terkal left Odessa with nineteen kopeks (about twelve cents) and returned with 2,000 roubles (about \$1,000.) Just as he was about to leave his box for the last time the railway police observed his movements and he was arrested. The whole story came out at the trial, but the judge, taking a merciful view of his adventures, punished him with only three months' imprisonment.
