Resolution of Condolence.

At a regular meeting of Division No. 7, A. O. H., held in their hall on Monday evening, the 12th January, 1903, the following resolution of condolence was unanimously adopted:

The Board of Arbitrators was also re-elected. W. S. Loggie referred to the fact that at the last annual meeting this Board had strongly endorsed the passage of a bill by the Town Council, but since then the Council had given way to a petition of a few property holders, asking for the repeal of this important law. Ald. Nicol defended the Council's course, and said that although the Council was angry at having to repeat it, he felt that if the citizens wanted such a law swept away it should be done. Ald. Murdoch said that if a brick by-law was passed tomorrow, the first person who wanted to build in wood would get up a petition and everyone would sign it. Enough about brick laws for the present. Referring to the letter regarding the appointment of Lord Strathcona, W. S. Loggie expressed the view that he did not think such an appointment would be a wise move.

Moved by Geo. Watt, seconded by R. Flanagan; Resolved that this Board consider Lord Strathcona an eminently fit and proper person to fill the position of Governor General of Canada.

After some discussion, W. S. Loggie moved that the motion be amended by adding the words, "But that this Board declines to take further action in the matter."

The subject was further discussed and the motion, as amended, was carried. Messrs. A. J. Loggie, W. Gilbert and Chas. Radlock were elected members.

A Governor Shoots an Editor.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 15.—N. G. Gonzales, editor of "The State," widely known throughout the south, is in Columbia hospital in a critical condition as the result of a pistol wound inflicted by Governor James Tillman. It was an awful tragedy in broad day light on the most frequented street corner in the state capital. The excitement and indignation on the street was intense. Immediately after the shooting Governor Tillman was arrested. Two pistols were taken from him. From the police station he was taken to the county jail, where he is tonight under full protection of the officers. No fight or words preceded the assault. During the progress of Tillman's campaign for governor last August, Editor Gonzales in his paper called Tillman a deacon and a blackguard, and referred to him as a "criminal candidate" and "provisional liar." It was this and other such expressions it is supposed, that goaded Tillman to the desperate deed. Gonzales was going home from his office for lunch when he met Governor Tillman. There was only one shot fired and that entered the right side between the eighth and ninth ribs and passed through the forepart of the body, coming out just above the fore border of the ribs. At 9 o'clock Gonzales' condition was considered very serious, but showed no important change from what it was several hours earlier. Gonzales was unarmed when the shooting occurred. The shot from the muzzle pistol paralyzed him but as he saw the deadly weapon aimed at him again, perhaps for a fatal bullet, he cried out, "shoot again you coward." Tillman, however, changed his mind and let the pistol fall to his side.

Prosperous Year for St. Andrew's Church.

The annual meeting of St. Andrew's church was held last Wednesday evening. Hon. L. J. Tweedie was unanimously chosen to preside over the meeting, and Mr. George S. Othart was secretary.

Rev. D. Henderson, the pastor of the congregation, reported a year of growth and prosperity in every department of the work of St. Andrew's church. There were about 180 families connected with the congregation and 256 members. For the schemes of the P. S. church and Benevolent purposes, the church has raised \$565.

Messrs. D. P. MacLachlan and George Stothart reported on behalf of the Trustees, that the income of the church, for current expenses, was \$145 in excess of the expenditure, while over \$1,300 was expended on improvements on the church during the year.

The reports of the different organizations, viz.—Ladies' Aid Society, Westminster Guild, W. F. M. S., Mission Band, Sabbath School, etc., were of a most encouraging and hopeful character, and went to prove that 1902 was a highly prosperous year for St. Andrew's church.

Chatham Town Council.

A special meeting of Chatham Town Council was held on Friday afternoon at three o'clock. His Worship Mayor Snowball presiding. All the members were present. In the matter of the application of the committee of the local Orange Lodge for the use of the Town Hall for the session of the Orange Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, which is to take place here in March, it was ordered that it be granted at the regular schedule rate.

The Lawler match opened Tuesday night.

Skip McLeod's rink defeated Skip Hickey's, 20 to 10, and skip Ullock's rink defeated skip Brown's, 16 to 20.

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The Southern Operating Company's application for permission to put nickel-in-the-slot machines in the town was read and referred to the Police Committee.

An offer of the Imperial Oil Company to furnish oil to the town was read and referred to the Water and Light Committee.

Ald. McLeod, who had not attended the last three regular meetings of Council, explained that his absence was caused on two occasions by illness and, in the third case, he was unavoidably absent from the town.

Ald. Nicol moved that Ald. McLeod be excused for non-attendance under the circumstances stated. He referred to the fact that the venerable alderman had been a member of the Council continuously since it was established and expressed the hope that he would long remain in the position. The motion passed unanimously.

Ald. Hocken, from the Public Works Committee, read the following report:—

The claim of Mr. E. A. Strang against the town for the breaking of one of the plates of glass in his store on Canard street by workmen of the town excavating for water connections, referred to your committee. We beg to say that we have gone fully into the matter and would recommend that Mr. E. A. Strang be paid the sum of \$50 in full settlement of his claims against the town.
