



The Dominion Parliament is to meet for the despatch of business on 12th March. It is expected that the session will be a long one-perhaps of six months' duration. One cause that will

contribute to this is the business which was deferred last session on account of the King's coronation. Government measures will include a bill for the redistribution of constituencies, one providing for a railway commission, and a bill for the settlement of railway strikes by arbitration. The Alaska boundary affair will also be one of the important matters of discussion. New terms with the provinces will, no doubt, have to be considered also. A large number of other public measures and more than the usual number of private and local bills are promised. The members of Parliament will, therefore, have to spend nearly the whole summer at the

but could not get away without getting Vaccinated. Coun. Watt moved that it be fired. With regard to the first statement, it appeared that these gentlemen were setting their opinions up against the best medical authority on smallpox of the country. We know perfectly well that smallpox was in Kent, and a man who had come from there to Rogersville broke out with rash, and rash appeared in houses he had visit-d. Dr McDonald was sent there to investigate, and reported it was smallpox in the scaling stage. Dr. Hayes went there and came t the same conclusion, and they quarantined the houses that had been visited by the mar from Kent. They quarantined 22 houses within a week. The doctor in attendince on the cases said it was eczema; our adviser said it was smallpox. In order to be per fectly certain, we sent for Dr. Meahan, one of the best authorities in the province on smallpox, a doctor who has had a great deal of experience in it. We also sent for Dr. Fisher, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, and both of them pronounced it to be smallpox. Dr. Fisher said that the precautions that had been taken were proper. But even if it was not smallpox it was a contagious disease, and the other parishes did not want it carried to them. The Rogersville councillors were setting their opinions up against the medical experts. If it was the same disease that had appeared and died out last year, why did it spread so rapidly this year. If Dr. Bourret had known his business, reported the cases, and quarantined the infected houses, there would probably have been only three cases and the \$3000 cost would have been saved. In reference to the cost of the hospital the Board had paid \$2 a month for the house, and \$67 had been spent in furnishing it. This bill was a surprise to him. This expence could have been spared, as it was found that the people would not send their sick away from home to be treated.
