The decision of the Council re the sinking fund has been carried out. Seven bonds issued June 2, 1902, Nos. 74 to 80, have been purchased and the same endorsed "Property Sinking fund, Town of Chatham." Coupons No 1 of each bond, which became due before the bonds were bought, and, therefore, do not belong to the sinking fund -no accrued interest having been paidhave been detached, and will be charged to interest account and credited to bond
