Shot From Ambush.

A New York despatch of 21st inst. says Henry Dexter, the aged father of Orlando O. Dexter, a wealthy capitalist and lawyer of New York, who was assassinated from ambush in the Alirondacks, has announced | Montreal, that he will pay a reward of \$5,000 for the conviction of his son's murderer. Every foot of the country about the scene murder will be beaten over in the search.

The body of Orlando P. Dexter, the New York millionaire, who was assassinated near his summer home in the Adirondacks, near Santa Clara, New York, arrived at the Grand Central Station today in care of John P. Badger, Mr. Dexter's attorney.

"I have no doubt unlimited sums will be spent to run this cowardly assassin to earth." said Mr Badger. "Mr. Dexter was deliberately murdered.

His assassin planned the crime skilfully, and has so far covered up his tracks, but there are some clues which I hope will put us on the right track.

If a person in Chatham wishes to communicate with a person in Newcastle he will get a response from central after ringing the One call may suffice, but two or more are often required.

If you are told that "that wire is engaged," or that "somebody is talking to Newcastle" you ask that your number and that of the person you wish to communicate with be connected when the others have ceased

This, of course, is responded to with an "all right" but it is not always remembered, and you ring up central again and are told that you are now connected with your New-

When you call and put your receiver to your ear, you at once realise that you are connected with a lot of people.
