

practically the only lobster fishery in the Maine, and once in a while one is taken by Norwegian fishermen. On the other hand Breton yearly some 7,000,000 lobsters are taken for packing purposes, besides \$35,000 worth taken for shipment alive. Mr. Baker believes that if proper measures were taken for the preservat on of the spawn, by natural rather than artificial means, the lobster could be propagated so that there would be no fear of the destruction of the fishery as it has been destroyed on the Massachusetts coast, and practically destroyed in Maine

Mr. Baker's proposition in brief is, that the Dominion government establish certain pounds, so constructed as to be capable of containing the seed lobsters during the fi hing season. He advocates the adoption of the Maine system, under which the government would buy from the fishermen all seed lobsters, paying them an advance of 25 per cent, over the price paid by nackers or ordinary lobsters. At present, the fisherman, when he catches a seed lobster. washes off the spawn and sells it to the packer, because the packer would not pay for it, such a purchase being illegal. this government purchase the seed lobsters would be preserved and placed in a pound for propagation. At the close of the season they would be released in their native element to look out for themselves and

If 40,000 seed lobsters were thus purchased yearly the estimate is that if only two per cent of the spawn were saved it would mean the growth of 8,000,000 lobsters, a pretty good asset to set against the 7,000,000 taken for canning purposes.

At present the only propagation is artificial h t heri s which may or may not be of any value. There is one hatchery near Picton, two in Prince Elward Island, two on the coast of New Brunswick. On the south shore of Nova Scotia and, in Cape Breton, nothing at all is done for the preservation or propagation of the lobster.
