
The town of Frank, in the N. W. T., was, on the 29th ult., visited by one of the worst disasters that has ever been known in Canada. It was at first thought that it was a volcanic eruption but further investigation showed that it was caused by a rock slide from Turtle mountain, at the base of which the town is situated. The number of dead

is now placed at eighty-three of whom about fifteen are women and tifteen children.
