DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE WILL DUFLI CATE PRIZES.

The Mon. Sydney Fraser, Minister of Agriculture, has authorized the live stock commissioner to announce that any Canadian who exhibits horses, cattle, sheep, swine, or poultry at the St. Louis exposition, will receive such services as are granted to exhibitors in other classes, and in addition the Department of Agriculture Will pay each such exhibitor a sum equal to the prize money which he secures in the competitions for which he enters. The Expisition authorities have asked that the Commissioner of Exhibitions shall countersign or endorse the certificates of registration of pure bred stock. All entries or applications for space for live stock should be addressed to Mr. Wm. Hutchison, Commissioner at the Canadian Building, Exposition Grounds. St. Louis. About nine o'clock on Thursday evening, Con Sweeney's special freight train, west bound, met with an accident. Five cars were thrown off the track, and two of them considerably broken up. John McRae, a saloon keeper, has been arrested at Glace Bay, C. B., for the murder of his father, John McRae, in a scuffl , in the former's bar room on Saturday night. The eld man came in somewhat under the influence of liquor and demanded meney that he had given his son for safe keeping. The son refused and a scuffle followed in which father and sen fought about the bar, and a heavy blow on the father's jaw was struck by the son. Finally the son pushed his father into a hallway leading from the street. Here McRae fell to the fluor, where he was found later, dead. The sou's arrest followed shortly after. Blood was spattered all ever the floor, and walls of the saloon, indicating a desperate struggle. Both men were of splendid physique and well proportioned. The McRace came to Glace Bay a few years ago. The murdered man was about 55 years of age and leaves a wife and family of six children dependent on him. The son is also married. McRae's death was caused by a clot of blood forming on the base of the brain, due to the blow received on the jaw. This is the third murder in Glace Bay within a year and a half, all due to brawls of a similar nature to the present.

A portion of the troops had already started to march from the post, but those outside the fertifications immedintly ran back to cover, save one Sepoy. He refused to budge and received the charge of the whole 700 Thibetans. After shooting five of them he was cut down, despite a heavy fire from the post. The Thibetane reached the walls and attempted to elimb over, backing at the men at the loopholes with their swords and even seizing the muzzels of the protruding rifies.
