### Manufactured Noses.

There was exhibited last week in th "Maine Room" of the Falmouth Hotel, Portland, to the members of the North American Fish and Game Protective Association, a few of a lot of eighty six "noses" of seals which were manufactured by indians with the object of getting the bounty of \$1 each offered for seals' nones by the State of Maine. The noses had been made by cutting out pieces of seal skip. sewing bristles in for whiskers, and then slitting openings for nostrils. The bristles are sewn in and a knot at the end holds them from falling out, but a sharp pull draws them through the hide, and then it is seen that they never grew there. The indians who presented this particular lot were arrested. It has been discovered that the state has been defrauded out of several thousand dollars. For years the authorities have been accepting fake noses, and as most of them have been destroyed they cannot make any arrests for those. In Portland alone \$2,642 was paid in seal bounties last year, and of this amount one man received

The Maine authorities were told by a New Brunswicker present that such "injunuity" could not be exercised in his province, for in cases in which bounties were offered for killing lynx, the skin with the nose intact had to be brought to the officer, who himself out it off and destroyed it, giving the applicant a certificate on which he drew the bounty.
