### Transvaal War to be Reproduced at | not yet b en constructed. the World's Fair.

[By Louis Larive.] St. Louis, Mo., 30. - A site for the instal. lation of the Transvaal Military Spectacle was tentatively granted by the Division of Concessions of the World's Fair on the area close to Skinker road, southwest of the Temple of Fraternity. The ground wooded and of a rolling contour, admirably ad pted to the purpose designed -the reproduction of the principal events in the South African War. The grant of the site resulted from a conference held today with President Francis by Gen. B. J. Viljoen and Cent. Arthur Lawis, managers of the enterprise. The district is 300 yards square, an ares larger then that occupied by the Jerusalem exhibit. The site, which is directly across Skinker road from the Palace of Agriculture and the Canadian Building, is closely served on two sides by the Intramural railroad After the conference with President Francis, Capt.
