Mr. McKewen with a majority to rival Mr. Blair's. H. F. McIntyre, M. P. P., of Restigouche, entirely agreed with the resolution, and said it was an auspicious occasion when the Liberal party headed by Laurier took power and began the grand career which had marked it up to the present. He spoke of Canada's prosperity and of the bright future in store for it.

MATAPEDIA.—Although the Post Office department—and newspapers as a rule—have long been spelling Matapedia correctly it is only this week that the Intercolonial railway people have officially abandoned the incorrect practice of putting an 'e' in place of an 'a' as the second letter of that place's name.

Hon. L. J. Tweedie was received with great cheering. He congratulated Hon. H. R. Emerson on his appointment, and wished him every success. Politically and personally Mr. Tweedie was with him every time. He said he (Tweedie) was no Conservative, and no Liberal—a kind of Ishmael. He didn't come to make any declaration of political faith, but the present government was good enough for him. He praised Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and said no one not prejudiced could say that the policy of the government had been beneficial to the dominion. Mr. Tweedie assured Mr. Emerson that he had the sympathy and support and fighting ability of the provincial government behind him. (Cheers.) As to the St. John election, was it to St. John's interests to ask government assistance and send an opposition man to parliament? He felt no doubt of the election of Mr. McKewen, and spoke of the value of ward work. Mr. Tweedie thought there was a good time in store for New Brunswick. Mr. Emerson knew the province thoroughly, and he felt satisfied we had nothing to complain about and the party would be stronger than ever after the next election. He spoke of New Brunswick's claim against losing one of our representatives at Ottawa, and spoke for support and assistance for Mr. Emerson in every way.

DEATH OF MR. WILLIAM KEATING.—The sad news is received in Newcastle that Mr. William Keating, eldest son of Mr. Patrick Keating, dropped dead at Boston on Sunday afternoon. The remains were to leave Boston at 7 a.m. on Tuesday to be brought home for interment. Mr. Keating leaves a widow (formerly Mrs. Anne McGraw, daughter of the late Dennis McGraw of Newcastle) and five children, with whom as well as with the other relatives much sympathy is felt.

Hon. C. H. LaBilloy was warmly welcomed. Dr. Pugsley said he was a young Liberal but he (Mr. LaBilloy) thought he was the youngest Liberal in the room. (Laughter and cries, "O' welcome.") Mr. LaBilloy spoke of property under Sir Wilfrid Laurier, of unity of classes and creeds (applause) and said it was the duty of every citizen to assist Sir Wilfrid. (Applause.) He praised Hon. Mr. Emerson and said credit was due to him for New Brunswick prosperity. Outdoors were interested in the St. John contest and St. John would make a great mistake if it did not return Hon. Mr. McKewen by 2,000 majority.

It is only about three weeks ago that Mr. P. J. Combeau, of Petit Roche, died, and on Thursday morning last, one of his sons, Mr. Alex Combeau, who had been, for some 22 years, a resident of Boston, but had come home, also died of paralysis. Deceased was 45 years old. He was a brother of Mr. A. L. Combeau, well known in Chatham as an employee in the establishments of Mr. R. Flanagan and the J. B. Snowball Company, and who is at present employed by Mr. James Flanagan, Moncton. Another brother, Mr. T. Combeau, is with the Peter McSweeney Co. of Moncton.

At the afternoon session there was another large attendance and a resolution endorsing the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was unanimously carried. Addresses were also delivered by O. Turgeon, M. P., John Morrissey, M. P., H. F. McIntyre, M. P., P. P., Hon. C. W. Robinson, F. B. Carvell, Premier Tweedie, Attorney General Pugsley, Hon. C. H. LaBilloy, C. J. Osmán, M. P., P., A. B. Copp, M. P., and others.
