

"The convention revived the New Brunswick Liberal Association, appointed officers and representatives from the cities and counties on the provincial executive, and passed resolutions as out lined yesterday. In the afternoon, a number of speeches were made by men from various counties, and the day closed with last evening's mass meeting in the Ope:a House."

Having thanked the meeting for the warm welcome extended to him, he expressed his gravification at the large and representative meeing. Touching upon his call to the cabiner, Mr. Emmerson said he felt it came at a organization of the counties.

John Dryden, W. S. Spark, Canterbury, Eng., R. Ness Howick, Quebec, F. W. Hodson, J. H. Grisdale and Dr. Rutherford, Ottawa.

On Monday, March 7th, the first session of the National Association of Canadian Stock Breeders will open in the City Hall. Ottaws, and continue during the week. The same day the Central Canada Horse Show will open, and simultaneously the Eastern Ontarie Winter Fair and Poultry Show. These events will be made educational by
