FAVOR OF THE DOMINION PULP COM-PANY OF MIRAMICHI. The Bangor Commercial says :-

"An important decision of unusual interest here has been handed down by board of general appraisers in New York. relative to the duty on chemical pulp imported from the Province of New Brunswick. The duty on unbleached chemical pulp is one-sixth of one per cent, per pound. In addition to this there has been a duty of 25 cents per 1,400 pounds on the theory that an export duty of a ke amount was levied by New Bunswick on chemical pulp sent to this coun-

"The American tariff act provides for an additional duty on all chemical pulp imported into this country from a foreign country or dependency of the Unit d States, where the country exporting charges an export duty, the amount of the additional duty to be levied to be the same amount as the export duty of the foreign country, which in the case of Canada was construed by the Treasury department to be 25 cents on 1,400 pounds of chemical pulp.

"The low water of the past few months in Maine and New England states has been the cause of a large amount chemical pulp being impor ed Canada. Ou all of this there has been levied the import duty of one-sixth of one cent per pound and the additional duty of 25 cents per 1,400 pounds of the pulp.

"The principal province from which the imported pulp coming into this state has been sent is that of New Brunswick. The Dominion Pulp Co., a New Brans. wick corporation, made a protest against the assessment of the duty by the collector of the po t of Banger, and took the matter before the general appraisers in New York for their decision, which has just been handed down.

"The finding of the general appraisers is that the assessment is wrong and they ordered the remission of the extra duties assessed on the ground that there was no export duty on unbleached chemical pulp exported from that province.

"In September, 1902, the Treasury department of the United States notified all collectors that an export duty of 25 cents per 1,400 pounds on unbleached chemical pulp was charged by Canada, and instructed them to levy a like amount on all importations from that country in addition to the fixed duty of one-sixth of one cent per pound on the article. At the customs office in Bingo the collector was obliged to go back for some distance and collect the extra tax on importations that had been made through this port. Since that time, acting under extra levy has been made up to the time when the decision of the general apprais-

China has, through her ministers informed other countries that her government has addressed both Russia and Japan reiterating her intention to be neutral, but declaring that the sanctity of the tombs of the Chinese dynasty at Mukden and elsewhere must be respected by the belligerents. China's communication states that she has troops at Mukden and other points in Manchuria, and in case either Russia or Japan deseorates the tombs, or in other ways does injury to China, orders have been given to the troops to vindicate the honor of China and meet force with force.

That China should send this communication at this time is regarded as extraordinary by the few persons who have knowledge of what has taken place, and has made a profound impression. Even more extraordinary than the substance of the communication is its firm, almost defiant tone. It is indicative that Chins will not be an entirely negligible quantity in the war, that most strenuous efforts have been made to soften China, an that she only awaits the moment when she feels certain that Russia will be defeated to transform her neutrality into active hostility against Russia, and attempt to regain political and military control of Manchuria. ### As Good as any Other Fish

The ADVANCE had occasion, net long

since, to bear testimony to the excellence of the dogfish as human food, although its use has, heretofore, generally been confined to animals, such as hoge, cattle, dogs, etc. and in the making of fertilizers. The firm white flesh of the dogfish commended itself to the writer many years ago, and he found it more palatable than many other highly esteemed edible fishes, whether broiled or fried; and as a chowder fish the fresh degfish has no superior. A peculiar quality of the dogfish is the fact that it may be cured and put by as food for the lower animals without the use of salt. There may be, at the present time, some way of doing this which is an improvement on that of nearly a half century ago, but in those days the fishermen along the coast of Nova Scotia used to out the heads from and draw the fish, then split them clean through from head to tail, leaving the two separated sides attached by small portion of the flesh and skin at the tail. The fish were then washed and hung close together over poles from one inch to three inches in diameter to be weather dried. These drying poles were placed horizontally been made.
