NEWS AND NOTES. The British steamer Pydas, Capt. Crossby which arrived at Pictou, Eng. from Miramichi, Wednesday, was discovered to be on fire while discharging her deckload and a compartment was flooded.

CHARLOTTETOWN, June 5.—Cary Nation came to town last night from Pictou and will stay on the island several days. She says St. John is the worst city in the province that she has yet visited.

Menior, the chocolate king, who owns the island of Antiochi has given up the idea of running the island as a business concern. He expelled a colony of Methodists a few years ago, as he wanted their lands to build works on, but the latter have proven a failure and Menior has sunk about \$1,500,000.

MONCTON, N. B., June 3.—A meeting of the Directors of the New Brunswick Pulp Co. was held here yesterday. Those present were Hon. H. R. Emmerson, N. Curry, Arthur, B. F. Pearson, Halifax; A. D. Orchard, Dorchester; Hon. A. B. McClellan, Riverview; C. S. Pickman, Dorchester; and F. H. Deason, Toronto, were appointed additional directors, making nine altogether. A committee was appointed to consider the subletting of territory to several parties who wish to begin logging operations.

HALIFAX, June 6.—The death occurred at 7 o'clock this morning of John J. N. Ritchie, of the supreme court of Nova Scotia. He was stricken with an affection of the heart a week ago, but up to that time appeared to be in good health, although it is understood that his physician had informed him that he was in some danger of heart disease.

New Brunswick Moose in Newfoundland. The steamer "Bucco" having resumed her regular trips between Sydney and Port au Baquet, the New Brunswick moose which were captured in the spring for the Newfoundland Government—four of them which survived their captivity—were placed on an interloper car especially equipped for the purpose, at Newcastle, on Tuesday morning last week under the superintendence of guide, John Connell of Barbylog, who with Mr. R. H. Armstrong, of Newcastle, had the contract with the Newfoundland Government for furnishing it with the animals.

Association, a body which comprises all the canners and those interested in the industry on the Fraser River. Their work consists largely in dealing with general matters affecting the industry as a whole, for purposes of mutual benefit rather than for commercial enterprise direct. Mr. Wilson was a member of the first executive of this association and is still a member.

At the inception of the British Columbia Packers' Association Mr. Wilson was elected one of the first board of directors, a position he still retains. When the organization was completed, he was elected secretary-treasurer of the new company and held that position until the annual meeting in November, 1903. Then, upon the retirement of Mr. M. Doyle from the general management Mr. Wilson was offered and accepted the position of secretary-treasurer. Still a comparatively young man, Mr. Wilson has identified himself with public affairs in the city of Vancouver and in the province ever since he has been a citizen. Though he has never accepted public office, choosing rather to render service to the people in a private capacity, there has been more than one occasion when strong representations were made to him to induce his acceptance of office, notably that of Mayor of Vancouver, a position to which the people at one time urged him to look.

Rev. Dr. Campbell Turned Down. A sensational incident of the Presbyterian General Assembly arose last Saturday in connection with the affairs of Montreal College. Dr. Morris submitted the college report, which carried recommendations for the appointment of Dr. Scrimger as principal and Dr. J. Fraser, of St. Stephen's church, St. John, to a professorship. Mr. Morris moved that the report and recommendations be adopted, and the motion was adopted by the assembly.

Dr. Scrimger seconded this motion, and testified to the cordial relations that had existed between Dr. Campbell and himself, and between all the members of the staff and Dr. Campbell while the latter was acting principal. The committee was appointed, with Rev. Dr. Fletcher as chairman. Rev. Dr. Fletcher, of Queen's was named on the committee but asked to be excused, as he was a delegate and the position would be a very delicate one. He was accordingly excused.

It seems that Dr. Campbell's being turned down was influenced by the fact that he was charged with heresy eleven years ago before the Montreal Presbytery and condemned by a large majority. He appealed to the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, which body overthrew the majority vote of the presbytery. Professor Campbell is noted for his scholarly attainments, and is a member of the Canadian Institute, Toronto; the Celtic Society, Montreal; corresponding member of the Literary and Historical Society, Quebec and the Society of Biblical Archaeology, London, and many others. He is also a fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and received the degree of L. L. D. from his alma mater in 1889. He is a very prolific and powerful writer.
