It was at first reported that he was fatally injured, but it, fortunately, turns out that it was not so bad as that. He was taken to Sherbrooke after being picked up— which was done immediately after the accident happened—and placed in the Protestant hospital there.

Home Again. Dr. O'Leary. At St. Basil he attended the election of a Superiorior of the Hospital Nuns of St. Joseph who are in charge of the Hospital, Academy and Orphan Asylum conducted by that organization, which numbers at St. Basil, about thirty members.

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NEWS AND NOTES. Miss Margaret Anglin, the actress daughter of the late Hon. T. W. Anglin, has bought a beautiful home in Surrey, England. The Japanese have offered to let their Russian prisoners work at building a harbor at Matsuyama, to "pass away the time," and earn the usual wages, with which they will be able to buy themselves luxuries during their imprisonment.

Robert Leat, of Harcourt, Kent Co., was arrested on Monday by Constable Andrew Ferguson and taken before Stipendiary Magistrate Watson on a charge of criminal assault on Emma Merseaux, a girl of twelve or thirteen years. Last was committed for trial in the Circuit Court, Tuesday night, while allowed to much liberty, he took French leave and left the village.

Thirty thousand acres, or 47 square miles, believed to be the most valuable wild land ever sold in Maine in one lot, was transferred last month by the N. G. Shaw Lumber Company, of Bath, to the Hollingsworth & Whitney Company. The tract included nearly all the Lilly Bay and Day's Academy townships bordering on Moosehead Lake, and the land is covered with valuable spruce hemlock and hardwood.

It is now believed that the projected pulp and paper mill at Calais, Me., will be erected. Frank H. Todd, of that city, has completed the necessary preliminaries for the conveyance of the timber lands which the projectors demanded to assure the required supply of pulp wood, and it is now expected that an early date ground will be broken for the erection of the plant. The mills will be erected at Sprague's Falls, a short distance above the city. The St. Croix Valley abounds in spruce and other timber suitable for pulp making and the supply is sufficient to last for an indefinite period.—Paper Trades Journal, Aug. 25

In the Coronation cup matches at Sydney "Cibou" won the first race from the start by about three lengths. In the second, on Monday, only Cibou finished race, Cabot meeting with an accident before she had gone over the first leg of the course. After a well contested race, during which Cibou kept the lead, the halyards of Cabot broke and her mainsail went over, putting her out of the race. Cibou, which was three quarters of a mile ahead, finished about sixteen minutes faster than on Saturday. The Cabot's new spar will be in position for the third race on next Saturday.

Among the passengers on the Montreal express to-day was Mr. William O. Forster, of Dorchester. Mr. Forster, who is a son of Mr. John B. Forster, ex-governor of Dorchester penitentiary and is also a graduate of the University of Mount Allison, will spend a few days at his home and will then proceed to Fredericton, where he is to become the curate of St. Ann's Episcopal church. He will be ordained in Fredericton on Sunday, the 18th inst. After graduating from Mount Allison, Mr. Forster spent some time in the Divinity School of King's college, Windsor, and since then has been acting as lay reader at Fort Fairfield, Maine.—St. John Globe 9th.

Lord Strathcona, the Canadian High Commissioner in London, in his annual report to the Canadian trade in England, says that the Canadian pulp and paper trade is not satisfactory. He says that an importer, who has long been connected with Canadian interests, regrets that those who have spiltable timber limits and water power confine themselves to the making of pulp at little or no profit, when if they would make the necessary further outlay and manufacture paper instead of pulp they would reap a reasonable profit from a steady trade. This, he says, is borne out by facts, for while during the year two or three pulp mills have closed, more than one of the mills making paper have added to their capacity.

Fredericton, Sept. 5.—Six persons were burned to death early Sunday morning in the destruction of a house on the Curry Mountain road, in the parish of Douglas, above Fredericton. A few years ago Charles McGibbin sold the premises to Alfred Jewett. The latter has since his occupation made considerable improvement to the place, and with his wife and three children lived there. Not very far from the Jewett home, Mrs. Jewett's sister, Mrs. Edward Clark, resides with her husband and family on what is known as the Caverhill road, and it is often the custom of the two families to travel to and from town together.

On Saturday Mr. and Mrs. Clark, with their daughter, a girl of sixteen years, drove to town, and late in the afternoon started homeward with Mr. Jewett. On reaching Mr. Jewett's they turned in, and the Clarks decided to spend the night rather than drive on home in the storm.

Early Sunday morning, one of the neighbors was startled to hear screams coming from the Jewett house and, rushing out, found Mrs. Jewett standing in the front doorway clad in her night dress. At the same time smoke was pouring out of all the upper windows, where the sleeping rooms were. Mr. Jewett got a ladder and tried to climb in a window, but it gave way, and he was hurled to the ground,
