From Douglastown

Mr. R. H. Jessamin, of Douglastown, Northumberland Co., N. B., writing on the subject of that village in The Maritime Merchant, says:

"The chief industries of Douglas'own are farming, lumber-milling, and in the winter months, smelt-fishing. The district seems to be fitted for various kinds of factories; for instance a pulp and paper mill, a boot and shoe factory, a factory for the manufacture of small wood, shooks, matches, etc. chief essentials to establish such industries and carry them on successfully.

"Agriculture is carried on to a fair extent. We have not very many vacant farms. The others are not worked as they should be With regard to a market for eur produce, we have Newcast e, which is 31 miles away and Cha Lam 15 miles.

"Grain, roots and fruit do fairly well here and hay is our staple product. Quite likely our district is best suited to these departments. Meantime, cattle and hay raising are carried on to a fair extent; quite a let is done in eggs; cheese and butter are not produced to any great extent; sheep raising is becoming less and less.

"There is no growth of timber here, but Messrs. Turnbull, and Munroe's Shingle good timber comes from various points up the river. I can hardly say that there is a future for lumbering right here, but the lumber industry of the section might be helped along by the establishment of a wood working factory here

> " Smelt-fishing is the chief things here in this department of activity. A. & R Loggie, Loggievi le. are fitted in good shape te can them, while W. S. Loggie, of Chatham, sends away immense quantities of frozen fish. The canning and freezing of these fish have become very valuable to the people here.

"With regard to the tourist traffic, very many tourists go through here to the hunt ing and fishing grounds, three or four miles from us. We are nicely situated on the river, which is three-quarters of a mile wide here. Boats make four of five trips a day, calling here both ways."

Mr. Jessamin appears to be quite liberal in his views of Douglastown, when he, inferentially, comes ever the Miramichi and annexes Chatham and Loggiville industries and also filters so many tourists through his enterprising villiage. Many of his neigh bers, however, will hardly agree with him in his intimation that there is no future for the lumber industry there. Miramich peoply, generally, have the impression that there is not a more successful lumber business anywhere in the Maritime provinces than that of Mr. Hutchisen, which is worth much more to Douglastown than all i other industries.]
