"Old Neilson" is the name of a handsom well-modeled tug boat which was launched last week by Mr. James Neilson, her designer and owner, from the Ruddock building yard, Chatham. She is of 62 ft keel. Mrs. E. Lee Street, of St. Andrews, is with an over-all length of 69 feet, 14 feet juniper, the bottom of birch and topsides, spruce. The master builder of the hull was Mr. Danl Desmond.

> The boiler is of the Scotch type, of 71 ft. diameter and 8 ft. long. It has one 42-inch flue and 92 tubes 51 ft. long and 21 inches diameter. The engine is compound with 8 in, high and 14 in. low pressure cylinders, stroke, 12 inches
