EARTHQUAKE: - A very decided earthquake took place on the Miramichi about a quarter after two o'clock Monday morning. It lasted about five seconds and was vibratory. The sensation produced within doors was very much like the trembling of a wooden building from the effects of a strong wind-squall, although the accompanying sound was little more than aud ble. Doors and loose windows were disturbed, so that the sounds made by their motions were heard, the door-catches rattling against the plates in which they were held.

There is a whatf frontage of over a quarter of a mile, at which large vesiels can be loaded; and the space in which to pile lumber is acres in extent. The boom, which is protected from every wind, is capable of holding six or seven millions of lumber. This mill will have a capacity of fifty to sixty M. feet of deals in ten hours. The new collector is a native of St. John whos father, the late John Dunn, came from Derry, Ireland, to that city in 1818. and his brother once had a lumber planing mill on Prince William street in which dimensioned lumber--from pine to mahogany-was manufactured and a cabinet m king business carried on in connection

The elder Dunn followed this business 1854, when he purchased a farm in Musquash, where he subsequently engaged in farming during the remainder of his life. Bis wife, Martha, was a daughter of Charles Gould, who came from Somersetshire (Eng.) to Sussex (N.B.) and later removed with his appears: family to Cambridge (Mass.) Their children were Mrs. S. J. Parkin, R. C. John, J. J. Dunn, of California; Albert T. Dunn, Thomas, A. W., Frederick B., of Musquash, and El-anor T, who is the wite of C, C. Clinch. John Donn was a member of the municipal council for many years He died died in 1888 sged sixty-seven years.

Hon A. T. Dann, was born in 1842. He was about twelve years of age when the family moved to Musquash, where he has since resided. For eighteen years he held the office of collector of customs at Musquash and he was also a member of the municipal council In 1892 he resigned his collectership to enter provincial politics. He has for a great many years been engaged in the pork packing businsss, at the same time carrying on successful farming operations. He became a member of the executive with out office in succession to Hen. H. A. Conneil of Carleton county, and was made surveyor general in the Mitchell ministry, Emmerson ministry and Tweedie ministry. Personally Mr. Dunn is a most affable and courteous man. His business reputation has always been excellent and his integrity in all his relationship; with public trusts and administration has never been questioned. The despatch further proceeds to say that he did not say in what way. Wherein Mr. ing, it confirms what I said, because Sr Wilfred, in a frank and statesmanlike manner has informed parl:ament and through parliament the country, that he favors a reconsideration of the subsidies. The despatch is slightly in error in representing in his statement that he had received a request from the premiers of several provinces because a request for the increased subsidies was made by the governments of all the provinces of Canada.

Sir, I am quite aware that until the government, whether it be the federal govern ment or the provincial government, acts as an executive sitting in council and its action is endorsed by the governor general or the lieutenant governor as the case may be so that its action becomes embodied in an order in council, the premier could no properly say that the government had take. any particular course with regard to this important question, but the statement which Sir Wiffied made that he was favorable to a reconsideration of the subsidies, is, as I am sure the house will agree with me, entirely in harmony and in support with the statement which I made, and if I had nothing else to rest upon than the statement of Su Wilired in parliament as reported in the Sus, I would still be prepared to say that it warrants us in having the strongest pos. sible belief that the request of the province as embodied in the Cuebee resolution will be

emplied with. With regard to what I am said to have told the electors of Kings in regard to the ishery award all I stated was that the dominion government, on being pressed by the government of this province, of Quebee and P. E. Island had agreed to a case being prepared which could be referred to the courts.
