As he returned to the older home, which whether French or Eaglish or Irish or Scotch we could never voice of authority which his high position enabled him to use the statement of what lay before this country, and the possibilities of the magnificient destiny that, under God, it was created to fulfil. (Applause.) Sometimes he saw, as he looked over this great country, a vision of what would surely come to pass, and that was the great and mighty rivers of this mighty land, by force of science made navigable; the great stretches of our magnificent country densely popul ated, cities where there were now towns towns where there were now villages, and villages where there were now uncultivated wastes-a mighty nation, and let us hope and trust, a nation really at one within itself -('Hear, hear' and applause) -a nation that could work out its destiny, under God; English, French, Irish, Scotch, Canadian, under the greatest flag that ever flew-(cheers)-a flig that wherever it moved, told the unjustly outcasts of many countries that there was liberty beneath its magnificent folds. (Loud applause.) He could see this with his aging eyes; other eyes would see it in reality. He thanked God that we had, in the person of the Governor General, ove who could bear with him to England it, was this Canada of ours.

SIR ALEXANDRE LACOSTE.

Sir Alexandre Lacoste, Chief Justice said that having been invited as Chief Justice, he took advantage of the occasion to de honor, honer in his own name and in the name of his colleagues to the representative of the King and to Lady Minto personally, As a citizen of Montreal he was echoing the sentiments of his fe low citizens in thanking Lord Minto for having spent six years of his life to help us in working out our constit ution. He was sure his task had been a a pleasant one. To a man like him who had an elevated, broad and unprejudiced mind, being in a very exalted position, it must have been most interesting to follow the life of this young nation, the more so because it was part of the British Empire. He must have found it very interesting to compare the formation of this nation with the formation of the English nation, which had Norman and the Saxon. Both took root and out of these root, sprang the great and magnificent tree which is now the English nation. Traces of the two nationalities were still to be found in England in the language and in the legislation. In Canada we were at the beginning of what had been completed in England. We were two races, nay, three or four races, and we might take as an emblem the monument of Wolfe and Montcalm, erected in Quebec. There were two stones, one to the English hero, the other to the French, and upon these two stones there was one single obelisk made of one stone. That was the emblem of our nation. (Applause.) We were the foundation stones

of a nation. There were French, English Scotch and Irish, but we wanted to work on these one obelisk of one stone only. (Applause.) The English had one reason more than the French to be loyal: England had been their home. But the Freuch were not less loyal, they were loyal because of the British constitution which gave them liberty (Applause.) Their good wishes would

ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESI, Archbishop Bruchesi assured Lord Minto that most cordial feelings towards him had been frequently expressed by the cleigy of the Dominion at their meetings, and as to accept this cane in rembrance of us, and their clergy and of the Roman Catholics in the diocese he expressed the most perfect loyalty and the sincere affection for the Governor-General. That day they had been commemorating a great English saint Edward the Confessor, who had said that he would rather lose his kingdom than retain by war or shedding of blood. This seemed to him to express the sentiments of ou excellent King. The prophets spoke of the Messiah as the Prince of Peace. Elward the Confessor was a Prince of Peace, and we had another Edward on the throne who was a Prince of Peace (Applause.) Many compliments had been addressed to His Excellency. They were all deserved. But he would make him one which would please him, and it was sincere. During the years of his administration he found many warm friends and he did not have a single enemy. (Applause.) The Archbishop then paid a tribute to Lady Minto in French.

LORD MINTO'S OPINION OF CANADA AND ITS FUTURE. After expressing his appreciation of the magnificent reception tendered to him he

'I ean assure Your Worship that if during my term of office I have been fortunate enough in the fulfilment of my duties to earn for myself the appreciation of the people of the Dominion, I ask for ne greater rewardand I know I may say the same for Lady Minto-her interests have always centred largely in the welfare of this country and the happiness of its every day life, and it will always be a delight to her to hear of the further success of work with which she has been iden : fied.

Passing from expressions of regret connected with his leaving Canada he continued 'I hope Your Worship will absolve me from any intention of trespassing on the domain politics, but perhaps it may not be out of place for me to glance very lightly at the history of the six years that have gone by since, as Governor-General, I set foot in the Dominion. They have been years of marveilous prosperity, of great advancement in commercial wealth, of great development of the magn ficent resources of this wonder tal country; but greater influences on the history of Canada than any of these have come into existence, A great war has raised considerations as to the imperial responsibilities of the King's subjects "beyond the seas," and a great statesman

After dinner Her Excellency Lady is aiming at directing into one common channel the interests of the Motherland and her self-governing dependencies, (Applause.) We are in a transition state; the old order of things is passing away. Colonies are becoming nations (applause,) with a national sentiment of their own; but, I say it as strongly as I can say it, with no diminut on of affection to the Motherland from which they sprang. We are face to face with problem full of difficulties, no doubt; conditions are changing, and we cannot afford

to stand still. 'Now that I am leaving you, I will only say, work out the problem with all deference for the traditional doctrines of the O.d. World, with full regard for the hopes of your rising nationality, with all respect fo racial traditions-but remember always that what is good for the empire is good for Canada, and what is good for Canada is good for the empire. 'Your Worship, I have travelled much

broughout the length and breadth of the Dominion, and, preud as Canadians are of their country, I believe they can hardly exaggerate its future possibilities. I have just returned from the North-West-the Territories are, as you know, not new to me -but as the other day I rode through the Saskatchewan valley, beautiful beyond description, in all the brilliant coloring of the "fall," across prairies strewn with the 20 skeletons of extinct buffale herds, past Indian battle fields of only a few years ago, and as I found settlements growing into villages, villages into prosperous towns and mmigrants pouring on to the land, I realzed that we are at the commencement of new era. Your Worship, I am at any rate bear witness to the splendid promise of Canada's future-I can go home to tell the people of the Motherland that their kinsmen here beyond the seas are, by their own energy, day by day, developing imperial resource, and imperial wealth the vastness of which is as yet but little known. 'I hope I may always share in the aspir-

ations of the Canadlau people. And, Your Worship, I can assure you Lady Minto and will take home with us the warmest Cross & Blackwell's Lemon, Orange, and Citron Peels, California Seedecollections of our life here, and will never forget the farewell we have received from the citizens of Montreal.' (Applause.)
