Forres: - Our reporter visited Mr. James Connell's Fox warren at Little Bartibog on Monday and found it a very interesting spectacle. The stockade, or keep, is about 40x30 feet with walls of closely driven piling out off nearly even with the surface of the ground and the superstructure is of wire netting with board roof. The animals have made burrows within this all over the ground, in which some of them take shelter when strangers approach, while the others are less timid and remain above ground. There is a constant supply of running water in one corner of the warren and the animals seem to thrive well.




