Sporting Notes. Two Boston men, Messrs. H. W. Gibbs and Jas. Daley, started up the Tobique about three weeks ago for an outing embracing that river and the Nepisiquit. They went to Plaster Rock by rail, and pooled their canoes up the Tobique to Bathurst Lake, made a three mile portage to the Nepisiquit, and crossed down that stream to Bathurst. Mr. G. E. Armstrong, the well known guide of

Perth, gave the party a permit to fish the Upper Nepisiquit, and they claim to have had the sport of their lives. They caught trout ranging in weight from three to five pounds, and brought the skins of fifteen big fellows with them and turned them over to Messrs. Brown, Fredericton, to be "mezzed." They are most enthusiastic in regard to their trip, which they pronounce the best they had ever had. "We had some long carries," and roughed it quite a lot, but we were not looking for any soft snaps and didn't want them." He thinks the Nepisiquit a very wild stream, which offers plenty of excitement and magnificent trout fishing.

Dr. Daniel, M. F. Injured. Dr. Daniel, M. On the suggestion of the Doctor, Mrs. Daniel jumped from the rig and escaped unhurt, but in his efforts to curb the horse

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check, but as they had gained headway in the Hoffman store and burned through the unburned dry leading into Mr. Ken Brown's haberdashery, as well as got a hold in the tall vacant Creighton building on the east, formerly occupied by Messrs. Ferguson & Thornton and Roger Flanagan, respectively, the fight was an arduous and tedious one on account of the dense smoke. A warehouse in rear of Mr. A. J. Loggie's grocery store also took fire and was drenched with water, practically ruining considerable quantities of flour, meal heavy feed and other stock. The Hoffman and Creighton buildings were very badly damaged and will have to be practically rebuilt. The Hoffman dry goods stock, valued at \$14,000 to \$15,000, while not consumed by fire to any great extent, was completely deluged with water and is in a total loss as possible.

Mr. Brown's handsome outfit of patent chairs, mirrors and other up-to-date fittings, were hurriedly removed with little damage and conveyed across the street to the Post Office sidewalk. Some of the Hoffman Stock might have been saved in the same way if the owners had permitted it. Messrs. Hoffman had \$4,000 insurance on building and stock. Mr. Creighton had \$2,000, of which \$400 was on the warehouse in the rear, which was not injured. Fireman Wm. Lobban, while in the act of breaking a window in the Hoffman building to enable him to get a sledge through, slipped and fell forward, his wrist coming in contact with broken glass which cut it very badly disabling him as a hoseman for the remainder of the fire.

During the same day there were two alarms of fire caused by little blazes in the Dominion House, which, owing to the nearness of the town engine house, were soon extinguished. The same parties who started the Hoffman fire, or some others like them, made a similar attempt in the rear of Mr. W. J. Connors's store a little further down Water street. Some lining paper from a sugar barrel and stove sweepings were put in a barrel at the rear of the store on Monday, and on Tuesday morning it was observed that they had been set on fire and consumed, burning also a part of the staves inside of the barrel. The fire had evidently gone out of itself.

There are several obvious lessons to be learned from these fires. Some of them are that better night police service is needed; that the half dozen loafing class should be compelled to be off the streets and out of doorways and similar places "after hours" and that storekeepers and householders should refrain from placing inflammable stuff in or out of barrels about their out-of-door premises.

Chatham Town Council. The regular meeting of Chatham Town Council held on Monday evening, September 12th, and as a consequence the ADVANCE was not represented at the reporter's table on the latter date. We are, therefore, indebted to the Commercial for the following report of the proceedings: Dear Mr. Murdoch— As one member of the Council at least, is opposed to the town paying the expenses of your trip to Ottawa, I feel I would like to reimburse you treasurer—as your being with us contributed so much to the success of our visit. I would have offered to do so in the first instance but I was in doubt as to how it would be received, believing that the town was quite as much interested in the success of the trip as we were. If you kindly let me know if I may do so, I will send a cheque for the amount. Aid. Watt said the town was certainly interested in having the pulp mill started and the Mayor's expenses to Ottawa should be paid by the town. He moved that Mr. Crombie's offer be declined with thanks—Carried.

The Mayor read a letter signed "Unknown Friend" asking that something be done for the sake to step the sale of liquor, and that a law be passed to close the "barrooms" at 7 o'clock during week and at 6:30 Saturdays, being held. The letter charged the officers with being lenient. Mayor Murdoch said he simply read the letter to show that people actually believed that the Council had charge of the bars in town. It was simple as received almost daily, asking that the sale of liquor be stopped. A letter from the W. C. T. U. called attention to the large number of children in the park and on the streets late at night, and asked that a bell be rung at 9 o'clock at which time all children under 15 should be gathered in.—Referred to By-Law Com. A letter from Imperial Oil Co., asked for a renewal of contract for machine oil. Aid. Galloway moved that tenders be asked for the year's oil.—Carried.

Ald. Watt read a petition from residents of Elm St. asking that water system be extended to these streets. Aid. Watt said the last council had practically promised the petitioners that the system would be extended this year, and he moved that the matter be referred to Water Com. Ald. Maher also favored the extension. Aid. Galloway and Snowball favored giving these streets water, but thought the season too far advanced, and the finances too low to present to begin the work. Aid. Watt said that the last bond issue was secured on the understanding that the water and sewerage systems should be extended in the West End. Now, it hadn't been extended and he wanted the work done at once. Aid. Maher said that last year Ald. Snowball had agreed that the West End should have water, but instead of carrying this out it was neglected and the town spent \$300 in extending the system out King Street for no man's benefit. Aid. MacLaughlin would like to see the sewerage extended to the Colleen alley as originally intended. Aid. Watt moved an amendment that the prayer of the petition be granted. Amendment lost—3-5. Aid. Snowball moved that the Water and Sewerage Com. submit estimates at next meeting in case of water and sewerage. Aid. Watt reported from Board of Works recommending that deed be prepared for conveying the McLaughlin land for street to the town, and that \$100 be paid Miss McLaughlin for same. Also that A. C. McLevin be paid \$25 on his degrading to the town 3 feet of land in front of his store, Canada street.—Adopted. Aid. Snowball submitted light and water report and bills for month which were adopted. Aid. Maher of Fire Committee reported four fires during month; that two were reported in case of lower engine house, and the key placed at Lake Mills' house; that

action regarding fire alarm system had been delayed till Mr. Cunniff arrived; that it was believed the recent fires in east end were of incendiary origin and that a reward should be offered for apprehension of guilty parties. Ald. Maher moved that the Mayor offer a reward of \$30.—Carried. Aid. Snowball said there was little doubt about the fire being set by half drunk men whom the policemen shot from the center of the town like a man would shoot a flock of hens. Drunken fellows should be locked up and fined to the full extent of the law. Considerable discussion took place in regard to the breaking of the hose cart in going to the Irving fire, and Ald. Snowball moved that Mr. Carroll be made pay for repairs to cart, on account of his driver being in charge of it.—Carried. Aid. Galloway and some arrangement should be made whereby the town's property wouldn't be at the mercy of the tenants. It might be wise to collect damages but this should be a warning for more care to be exercised. Aid. Bentley thought a by-law should be passed giving authority to manage persons having fire apparatus. Aid. MacLaughlin of Finance Com., reported to the effect that T. F. & J. Whitty be relieved from personal property tax; that Mrs. Benj. Clancy's assessment be reduced to \$600; and that income assessment of Jas. Barry, sr., be reduced to \$100. The date for receiving appeals re assessment expired Aug. 28. The cost of advertising town in the Book of Canada would be \$25. That L. A. Curry, counsel in pulp mill tax matter, had reduced account \$30 and balance had been paid; that Hanson and Miller foundry suits had been postponed till November court; that it was found to be late in the season to arrange for a home week in connection with exhibition. Taxes collected to date amount to over \$22,000. Ald. Maher moved that no action be taken in regard to advertising town in Book of Canada.—Carried. Aid. Morris submitted the August Scott Act report: Thos. Flanagan, A. Mann, J. Johnston, J. R. McDonald, M. Jardine, D. Cassidy, Arthur Martin, all fined; Mrs. Shand, dismissed.—Report filed. Aid. Bentley said that the Council is not satisfied with the enforcement of the Scott Act. The \$380 collected in August is simply husk money—blood money. Men are being ruined by the saloons in town, and employers with some humanity about them actually have to struggle part of the men's pay to their wives in order to keep them from being in want. Drunkenness is steadily increasing in town and nothing is being done to put down the cursed traffic. Aid. Snowball moved that the Mayor be authorized to call a public meeting to consider a proposition from a company which proposes building a boot and shoe factory here, provided they get certain assistance from the town.—Carried.
