On the other hand, the shippers from Canad an ports-that is, Quebec and Montresl-still continue to make their forward sales at the full prices we have indicated hitherto. The tables of impor, consumption and stock show lit le or no improvement from last month, and this is a fair guide to the general slackness of bus ness in our trade.

In their monthly ei cular Messis. Farnworth and Jaidine say:-

The business of the past month has been dult, and buyers are slow in entering into engagements for next season's supplies. The arrivals generally have been larger than during the corresponding month of the pastitwo years, and whilst the deliveries have been fair, the business has not been of a satisfactory nature, and values of some of the lead ug articles are difficult to u a ntain; stocks on the whole are amy le.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Spruce and Pine Deals .- The arrivals during the past menth, chiefly by the winter liners, have rgain been large, and in excess of the corresponding period last year, viz., 2,710 standards, again t 2,400 standards in 1903; the deliveries have been fair, but stocks, although slightly less than the same month last season, are still large and, recent con ignments have been forced off at lower pr ces; contracting for next season is very quiet. Pine Deals, -The demand is slow.
