The Andover chickens, some of which vere reared at the station, and some bought rom farmers at 61 cents per pound, live weight, were sold at 12c., 13c. and 14c. per pound; part were exported to England and balance consumed on the Montreal

These chickens were fattened in crates and dressed on the English plan, without bleeding or removing the entrails, so that hey would weigh much more than chickens with head and feet and entrails all removed. This gives better returns to the producer and the consumer is not robbed thereby, for he in his turn gets a quality and flavor of meat that is only had when the skin unbroke and all the juices of the bird conserved until it is prepared for cooking. The Legislature.

The time of the Legislature at Fredericton has been quite fully occupied since Thursday with consideration of the New Highway Act Members are discussing it fully and there is a general desire on both sides of the house to make it as perfect as possible. In reply to some enquiries Hon. Labillois said -- By section three the distinction between great roads and by-roads is abolished and all roads on which public money is expended are to be deemed common and public highways and aubject to the provisions of this act,

Section six requires the Government to establish as many highway divisions in each county as they may think necessary. The Government will appoint superinten lents of

Section thirty-three provides that the superintendents be subject to the general supervision of the chief commissioner, and

shall have the sole ordering of the constructing maintenance and repairs of the highways in their respective divisions. Section thirty-four authorizes the superintendent to make sepairs either by days work

or by public auction. Section thirty-seven requires the superintendents to keep the flooring of all covered bridges covered with snow. Section thirty-six refers to the question of

Section thirty-nine is perhaps the most important in the bill. Statute laber abolished and in its place a road tax is

While no decision has been arrived at with regard to the large bridges my opinion is that there should also be bridge inspectors appointed. The province might be divided into fifteen bridge districts and an in pector

Another important matter to which I should refer is the habit of trotting on bridges. It is difficult to overestimate the amount of injury that has been done to our bridges with long spans in consequence of this practice. I propose that the law against this shall be strictly enforced without fear or favor.

On Friday .-Mr. Tweedie explained that there was no intention of having any different system of assessment for the roads from that now existing, excepting that the burden will be more equally distributed. The poll tax now \$1.50, but the present assessment requires a person with \$300 property to pay as much as a person with \$800 worth and this will be remedied in the new bill. The money levied as a road tax will probably be somewhat less than at pre ent. With regard to the distribution of money some roads will be struck off the list which are not really public roads. Private roads will no longer be receiving public money. The same amount will be distributed that is now given for bye roads, but its expenditure will be subject to the supervision of the board of works.


