In the processes of manufacture the starch is removed and the remainder of the grain is sold sanitary conditions and will have them under the name of gluten feed, which is well suited for dairy cows and fattening stock. Gluten meal is gluten feed without the hulls and germs of the corn and is very rich in protein and fat. It is a capital feed for dairy cows, but on account of its concentrated nature, should be mixed with bran or oats. Corn germ is very rich in protein and oil; after the oil is pressed out the residue is known corn oil meal or corn oil cake, also valuable feed. Corn bran is relatively low in feeding value. There are numer ous other "corn feeds" on the market.

The feeding value of oats is well known Oat hulls, oat dust, and oat feed or shorts are the chief by-products of this grain. Oat hulls are of little value for feed, but 10 Cases Pumpkin are often mixed with corn meal: etc., and the mixture sold as ground oats. Oat 15 dust consists chiefly of the minute hairs 15 removed from the kernel in the preparation of eatmeal. It has a fair feeding | 20 value, especially if broken kernels are present, and there is not too much mill sweepings. Oat shorts or oat feed varies greatly in composition, although the better grades show a feeding value similar to that of oatmeal.
