NEWS AND NOTES.

Sir Alfred Harmsworth and a number of other newspaper proprietors of London are reported to have closed negotiations for 1,500 square miles of timber areas in the interior of Newfoundland, on which they propose to erect the largest pulp mill in the world.

The old saw about early to bed, early to rise, etc., seems to be knocked out by the following: "To be forced to get up early," says an English physician, "grinds the soul, sours the blood, swells the spleen, destroys all good intentions and disturbs all the mental activities. Criminals are always recruited from the early rising class."

The trans continental railway construction commission is now complete. It is composed as follows: F. B. Wade, K. C. Annapolis, chairman; Alfred Brunst, Montreal; Robert Reid, London, Ont.; C. A. Young, Winnipeg; H. D. Lumsden, of Toronto, is the chief engineer, and Premier Parent, of Quebec, the government representative on the Grand Trunk Pacific directors. One of the conditions of their appointment is that the commissioners and engineer shall reside in Ottawa.

A London despatch of 17th says: The fishery protection cruiser, Canada, launched last June, left the Vickers-Maxim yard today for Canada, having completed her trials to the entire satisfaction of the authorities here. In order to ensure the best results the builders aimed at obtaining a speed of 17 1/4 knots. Under fair conditions she is always able to maintain her contract speed of 16 knots, but a 17 1/4 knot speed was obtained with the low power of 1,300 horsepower, her trials expansion engines with which she is fitted, running 177 revolutions per minute, while her two boilers worked with 130 lbs. steam pressure. The Canada looks very smart, her ram bow and raking masts and funnel giving the suggestion of strength with speed.

Friday's St. John Globe says:—A young lady who came from Boston on the train which left here at 7 p.m. Thursday evening and arrived here at 10:40 this morning called at the Globe office to enter complaint against the conductor of a number of her fellow passengers in the second class car. She said there were several men who started drinking as soon as the car left Boston and that they kept it up all night and got other passengers, including some of the women, to drink with them. The result she described as a regular carnival that was most unpleasant for those who did not wish to join in the revelry and who wanted to spend a quiet night. According to the lady the men carried wine and acted most disgracefully, trying to force liquor upon passengers, both male and female, who refused it, and when refusal was persisted in, calling them all manner of vile names. The liquor, she said, made some of the drinkers sick, and on more than one occasion passengers were disgusted with the spectacle. The young lady said that on two or three occasions she appealed for protection to the conductor on the Boston and Maine section and that he paid no heed. The Maine Central and C. P. R. conductors kept better order, she declared, but still the conduct of the passengers was such that respectable people could not find much to complain of.

The Factory Commission. The Factory Commission which has been taking testimony in different places in New Brunswick is late visited the Miramichi last week. It sat at Newcastle on Thursday, and a despatch of that date says:—The principal result of the sitting of the factory act commission here today was the unanimous opinion of those who testified that as far as the Miramichi is concerned no legislation regulating the conduct of the employers towards the employes was required.
