Ontario Highlands Hunting
10,000 DEER AND 100 MOOSE KILLED.

In connection with an official of the Grand Trunk Railway system, he stated that the deer and moose hunting season in the Province of Ontario for November last, was even better than previous years, as returns from the express companies and other channels demonstrate. The Canadian Express Company carried a total of 2,997 deer with a total weight of 309,101 lbs. This number shows an increase of 622 carcases over last year. These figures, of course, do not give any idea of the total number of animals killed, as the major portion of them are carried by other conveyances, and many of the hunters bring home the heads only, as trophies. It is estimated that about 10,000 deer and 100 moose were killed during the fifteen days open season in the "Highlands of Ontario." It has been noticeable this year, that a great many more specimens from the United States have gone up into the hunting regions and all having met with good sport. The partridge and duck shooting has been very good throughout the "Highlands," but quail has been more scarce than in past years.

Probably Suspected.
MERCHANTS INVEST IN MYTHICAL COLLECTING AGENCY.

About the end of December, a middle aged man, signing himself E. J. Collins, and representing the S. V. Collins' collecting Agency," Toronto, called on city firms and induced about 60 merchants to join the Agency.

An entrance fee of \$5 was charged and the firm was furnished with a form to be sent to the delinquent debtors which read something like this:
"Is looking over... books... this... have an overdue... amounting to \$... for... As... you have a chance to sell this to the O. E. Collins' Collecting Agency, Toronto, and do not wish to do so, please call or write at once on or before the... or... shall be obliged to sell."

The firm would fill in, sign and send to the delinquent.
If the account was not settled at a stated date, the bill was to be sent to the Collins agency, which concern agreed to buy the debt outright.

One firm who subscribed wrote to the agency in Toronto, asking for printed list on which to send a statement of delinquent accounts which the system might fail to collect. The latter came back unopened and marked by the postal authorities, "No such firm in Toronto."

A second letter was sent with the same result, and now the merchants are guessing. Previously it is said that the gentleman calling himself Collins had visited Campbellton, Newcastle and Moncton, when the same game was successfully worked.—St. John Gaz-ette.

Mr. Carling Kelly Loses.
The London Canadian Gazette says:—
"Mr. Justice Grantham and a special jury have had before them the case of Bradshaw vs. J. Carling Kelly, which was an action brought by a Liverpool stockbroker to recover £1,000 upon a bill of exchange, of which defendant, a Canadian, and a company promoter and financier, was the alleged acceptor. Mr. Kelly, it seems, came from Canada with the object of promoting the Sapphire Corundum Mine, and he, in conjunction with Mr. Hooley and a Mr. Lambert became the promoters of the Sapphire Corundum Company. The defence to the present action was that the bill was got from defendant by the fraud of Mr. Hooley, and that he gave notice of that fraud before the plaintiff became the drawer of the bill. This was a retrial of the action in consequence of defendant having sworn on the first trial that on March 1 he gave notice that the bill was obtained by fraud, and it was found by looking at the almanac, that March 1 fell on Sunday, and therefore the interview could not have taken place on that day. The jury found a verdict for the plaintiff, and his lordship entered judgment accordingly, with costs. This reverses the decision arrived at when the case was previously tried before Mr. Justice Darling."

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

The Breeding of Grain.
DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE,
Commissioner's B. Arch,
Ottawa, Jan. 14, 1904.
Good work has been done along various lines by the Dominion Department of Agriculture and by some of the Provincial Departments of Agriculture in Canada with a view to encourage the use of high class seed of the best varieties, but there is still room for a considerable increase in the average yield of common field crops by the use of better seed grain.

The object of forming associations of seed growers may not be perfectly clear to all. The idea may be new in Canada, but there are associations of seed growers in other countries, such as the Illinois Seed Growers' Association, that are doing good work. The benefits derived from such associations of breeders of live stock are pretty well understood. The advan-

Associations of breeders of pure bred stock fix a standard which must be attained before animals will be recognized as pure bred. In fixing standards of excellence for pedigreed animals the principles which underlie improvement are recognized. The same principles that are applied in the improvement of animals are also applied in the improvement of varieties of farm crops. Herdity is the lever by which improvements are made and on which the basis of other plants or animals depend is fix desirable characteristics; but the law that like begets like must be taken in its broad sense, because it would not be possible to make improvement if it were not for the tendency toward variation. Herdity and the tendency toward variation can be turned to account in the improvement of plants equally as well as in the improvement of animals, but unfortunately few farmers make any attempt to systematically apply these principles to the improvement of plants. Through herdity and variation improved varieties of field crops tend to revert to the wild types from which they evolved; but when these improved sorts are provided with the environment best suited to their growth, and the continued selection of the most desirable specimens practised, this natural tendency toward reversion is overcome.

Though it is highly important that the variety of grain well suited to the locality where it is to be grown, too much faith has been pinned to the names of varieties without due attention to the quality of the seed itself. It is not always recognized that there may be as much difference between two strains of seed of the same variety of grain as there is between two distinct varieties, so far as capacity of the seed to give a large yield of grain of good quality is concerned. It is therefore important to use seed of the best variety that has had kindly treatment and continued selection for several years. In the production of good paying crops the cost of the seed is small but the influence of the seed is great. Plumpness and freedom from impurities is not sufficient proof that seed grain is capable of giving a good crop. Breeders of poultry do not pay much attention to the size of eggs for incubation; they want, first of all, to know something about the good qualities that the germ in the egg has inherited from the parents, and not only from the parents but from the majority of the ancestors. It is equally important that seed taken from a crop in which the individual plants have had an opportunity to attain a maximum vigor and yield per plant, and it is just as important to have definite information about the crops and how the work of selection was carried on for several preceding years so that it is to have a knowledge of the ancestors of breeding animals. In consideration of the principles which underlie improvement in common farm crops, and in view of the limited supply and growing demand for high class seed grain, an effort is being made by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa to form an association that will operate for the mutual benefit of seed producers and seed consumers.

According to the provisional rules of the association, seed grain that is pure, true to variety, and that had the benefit of a system of careful growing and continued selection for three consecutive years, is recognized as improved seed. The operations of members are closely inspected and records are kept of the amount and pedigree of the seed they produce. It is proposed to issue a catalogue for general distribution each year in which names and addresses of members will be given, together with the kinds and varieties of seed produced by them, and the pedigree of the seed, the amount of seed for sale, and the price per bushel. It is also proposed to supply members with certificate forms, having printed thereon the rules with which members are required to comply in the production of seed. Purchasers of pedigreed seed may obtain one of these certificates with seed bought from a member; the signature of the member would be a guarantee that the seed supplied had been produced in accordance with the rules. The purchaser would then have an opportunity to verify the pedigree of the seed by having it registered.
