THE IRISH AGITATORS.

A London correspondent says: Mr. Parnell on Thursday night felt that it was comparatively safe for him to annoy the Government by obstructing the emigration clauses. He succeeded in delaying the progress of the Bill, and in filling Mr. Gladstone with rage, that found vent in a speech of great power and vehemence. Otherwise the week's work resulted in a dead loss to the Parnellites. Captain Nolan, the Home Rule whip, all along protested against the useless obstruction of a measure that, with all its shortcomings, will benefit the Irish farmer very considerably, and when Mr. Parnell began his old tactics again, Major Nolan threw up his position in disgust, and joined Mitchell, Henry, Shaw and other seceders. There are now three factions among the Home Rulers. Parnell, Healy, O'Connell, T. P. O'Connor, O'Kelly and Sexton are extremists. None of them, Parnell excepted, has anything to lose by anarchy and anarchy is their object. The second division consists of the brothers Sullivan, John O'Connor Power, Daley Commine and other moderate men, who do not think Ireland can be benefited by rowdiness in Parliament. The third faction comprises Mitchell, Henry, Shaw, the two Blennerhassetts, the O'Donoghues, McKenna, O'Brien and other men of substance, who are anxious to secure the amplest tenant right by constitutional methods adopted by Isaac Butt. Bigger is the fourth faction all by himself. Nobody outside the peasant class, which is easily led captive by any sun-burnt adventurer, has any confidence in Parnell's body guard. Parnell himself is above suspicion, but O'Donnell, Healy and the rest of the extremists are familiar figures on the Irish stage. The speech of the Duke of Argyll on the Bessborough Commission has led to a general discussion of the whole question of land tenure in Ireland. Baron Dowse, one of the wisest and ablest of the Irish Judges, who was a member of the Commission, routed his Scotch and English assailants with ease.

So says a partial and anti-Irish despatch. There is scarce a statement in the whole tissue that may be regarded truthful.

AFFECTIONATE GEES.

It is well known that geese and ganders become greatly attached to persons who habitually feed them and treat them kindly. But the attachment is seldom so great as that manifested toward an English miller who keeps a flock. to follow him to church. But on a recent Sunday they seemed to be in a devotional frame of mind and marched behind him as he went to the sanctuary. Arriving at the door they wanted to follow him in, and probably would have occupied his pew had he consented to let them do so. He undertook to make them understand that he wanted them to go home, but the innocent and awkward creatures failed to grasp the idea. Finding it impossible to make them return without committing violence on them, the miller was compelled to abandon his religious privileges for the day and proceed homeward at the head of the file of his feathered pets.

WRECKED BY A CYCLONE.

CHICAGO, July 16.—The town of New Ulm, on the Minnesota River, 65 miles from St. Paul, containing 3,500 people, was wrecked by a cyclone this afternoon. The wires are down, and only meagre details have been received. It seems that two currents of air swept the valley simultaneously, coming from different directions. The scene was appalling. Stone and brick buildings were raised to the foundation, and the air was filled with debris. The town is now a mass of ruins. West Newton, in a neighboring county, was also visited, and a family of three killed. So far as known, 12 were killed and 20 wounded, some very seriously. In the New Ulm Valley, in one instance, the headless trunk of a girl was found on the prairie. In another the trunk of an old man was found. An old gentleman was found dead with his arms clasped around a tree. Many persons had limbs broken, mostly Germans.

SFAX TAKEN BY THE FRENCH.

The French Squadron arrived at Sfax on Thursday, bombarded the town, and occupied it despite a vigorous resistance. The French lost eight killed and forty wounded. The French position is now safe. The place was strongly fortified by the Arabs, and surrounded by deep trenches. The French overtook the rear guard of the insurgents and killed 49.

THE LATE PIUS IX.

Cardinal Jacobini told the Ambassadors and Ministers accredited to the Vatican that the Pope desired them to inform their Governments how deeply pained he was at the insult offered the body of the late Pius IX. Henceforth he must consider himself more than ever a prisoner in the Vatican, and prevented from attending religious service in any of the Basilicas of Rome. Cardinal Jacobini read a circular to the Papal nuncios abroad, which is to be handed to the respective Ministers of Foreign Affairs. Part of the Pope's message relating to religious services in the Basilicas confirmed the assertion that had the body of Pius IX. been peacefully removed, the Pope would have found an early occasion for passing the doors of the Vatican. Six men were fined and imprisoned for disturbing the funeral procession of Pius IX. There was great disorder at the trial, and the court was cleared twice. The sentences were received with shouts and hisses. A crowd of three thousand cheered the prisoners when coming out of the court, and followed them shouting, "Down with the Clericals!" Soldiers dispersed the mob, which re-assembled at the office of one of the clerical newspapers, tore down the bulletins, and started for the railway station to protest to the King and Queen, just arriving from Naples, but the police prevented a demonstration. The late Pope Pius the Ninth was a voluntary prisoner in the Vatican from the 20th of September, 1870, when the army of Victor Emmanuel took possession of Rome, until the time of his death, eight years afterward. He refused both to leave the building and to accept the yearly revenue of \$625,000 provided for him by the Italian Parliament out of the national treasury.
