The man who tries to please everybody must surely do so at the sacrifice of his own principles and independence. Such a man is not worthy of notice. Lower still in the grade he comes if he be a journalist, for those to whom much has been given, much hath been required of.

We run a tri-weekly and a weekly paper in this little city. Heaven knows a tri-weekly is not too great a luxury for it. The crowd who would have us please them is legion. Just so soon as you try to be as independent as you can, you get on some fellows big foot and hurt his corn. Immediately he withdraws his support. And this is not all. Each and every such clown has a friend or two. If you happen to stand on one fellow's toe, you give a mortal wound to the whole ring. Now we have spite to-day against no one living, thank Heaven, and yet there are plenty we "go for" just because they deserve it. And just so soon as the STAR does come out, speaking fearlessly and honestly what it thinks to be true and right, some miserable clown turns up his nose, calls it a "vile sheet" and if he happen to have a few inches of advertisement—by the way something that he is very often in justice to his creditors not able to pay for—immediately withdraws. God help us! Things are come to a pretty pass when creatures like these wearing God's image only to turn it into a mockery, supports and controls the press.

The intelligent and the discriminating, the solid men of the community are with us and know all this as well as we. Why waste words to the others?

Newfoundland's Treasures.

We start in wonder as we hear of the discovery, every now and again, of the buried bullion and Mexican dollars of Capt. Kidd and Black Beard. Who has not been held rapt as he read Dumas' account of the Cave of Treasures on the Island of Monte Christo? Yet wealth greater than this—hills of copper nickel and lead, mixed with silver, are almost every day discovered in Newfoundland. The almost uninhabited regions of Green Bay, Tilt Cove, Betts' Cove and White Bay, prove to contain undreamt of wealth. The carpet of earth covers hills of copper, tons in thousands, of lead repose in the cliffs and the hills yet untouched. Accidentally some of these are being discovered, and to the owner, or he who is fortunate enough to purchase, it means millions. As if by the enchanter's touch houses and villages rise in these desolate spots. Ships from across the sea lie at the wharves taking in the precious cargoes. The sound of the blast, the hammer and the chisel now bursts upon nature's ear where once reigned primitive quiet. Mr. Ellerhausen is the central figure in the mining operations.

The key to Newfoundland's wealth has been found. Her fisheries are gradually on the decline, not so much on account of the quantities taken as the disturbance to the fishes; and indeed the late discoveries may be hailed as a God-send. People's attention will be attracted thither, settlements will soon be made and skilled agricultural and other labor will be introduced. With Newfoundland's mines in full blast, her shore fishery followed up, her forests opened and her thousands of fertile soil tilled, she will indeed be a happy colony. Men of pluck and capital only are required.

The Elections.

The elections are billed for to-day, and Mr. Blair and Thompson will be elected. They have gone over the field the second time like men, and can independently take their place in the next House unchargeable with fraud or bought influence. The tendency of the age seems to be towards fraud, short cuts, corruption, etc. The laws are made to guard against these, and it's just as well, perhaps, that the bad sores in the system break out that the cure may be applied. They take away the body of Stewart, three years buried, and hide it from the keenest detective's eye. Wondrous daring are the deeds,—barefaced and adroit as the far famed English highwaymen.
