

Legislative Council Chamber.

FREDERICTON, FEBRUARY 27, 1879. This being the day appointed by Proclamation for the meeting of the Legislature, at three o'clock His Honor the Lieutenant Governor came to the Council Chamber, and being seated on the Throne, commanded the attendance of the House of Assembly, who being come His Honor was pleased to open the Session with the following

SPEECH:

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council. "Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly. "It is with great pleasure I meet you for the first time as Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick. "You have already heard with profound sorrow of the great affliction which has befallen Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen in the bereavement which she has sustained in the death of Her Royal Highness the Princess Alice, Grand Duchess of Hesse Darmstadt. How deservingly the Princess had endeared herself to Her Royal Mother, and to the nation, has become matter of universal comment. In no portion of the Empire will Her Majesty's affliction be more deeply and sincerely deplored than in this Province, and I have no doubt you will readily join me in the expression of respectful sympathy which have reached, or are reaching Her Majesty, from all parts of the British Dominions. "The recent appointment of so distinguished a nobleman as the Marquis of Lorne as successor to the Earl of Dufferin, whose administration of the Government of Canada was so brilliant and successful, again testifies to the deep regard of the Imperial Government for the welfare of this Dominion, and has been hailed with unmingled satisfaction by all classes in every Province of Canada.

"The arrival in Canada of Her Royal Highness the Princess, the illustrious Consort of His Excellency the Governor General, has afforded the people of Canada another opportunity, which they have heartily embraced to manifest in a marked manner their loyal devotion to the Person and Throne of Her Majesty the Queen, and their love for the Members of the Royal Family. "Immediately upon the arrival at Ottawa of His Excellency the Governor General and Her Royal Highness, you transmitted an invitation to them to visit New Brunswick, and we are gratified to learn that His Excellency was pleased to accept the invitation, and that public announcement will be made of the time appointed for their visit.

"Notwithstanding the severe depression which so seriously affects the commercial interests of the Province at the present time, we are happy in believing with Your Honor that the general condition of the Province at large is such as to call for expressions of satisfaction to inspire our hearts with thankfulness, while we join in the hope that the prevalent commercial depression may soon be materially alleviated.

"We think that, notwithstanding the circumstances which operated against the recent Provincial Exhibition, it may be fairly affirmed that the Exhibition was satisfactorily successful. We shall consider the detailed report on the subject when submitted to us.

"We approve of the recent importation of a number of pure bred Leicester Sheep, and are glad to learn that they were highly commended by the best judges in such matters. We shall consider the detailed statement on this subject, also, when laid before us.

"We are pleased to learn that the Seed Wheat imported by the Government last Spring was very generally distributed over various sections of the Province, and that so far as Your Honor is informed the results have justified the expenditure in that behalf.

"We are glad to hear, also, that in view of the intelligent consideration which has recently been directed to the subject of the cultivation of Sugar Beet in different parts of the World, and with a view to encourage and facilitate a fair trial of so interesting an experiment as the culture of Sugar Beet in this Province, the Government has ordered the importation of a quantity of pure and reliable seed, and that due notice will be given upon its arrival. We join Your Honor in the hope that the cultivation of Sugar Beet in this Province may prove successful and remunerative.

"We thank you for your announcement that the Plans for new Legislative Buildings in Fredericton will be duly laid before us.

"We are pleased to learn, also, that the claims of the Government upon the Government of Canada have again received the earnest consideration of Your Council, and we do earnestly trust that the pending negotiations may terminate at an early day in the adjustment of all matters in difference in the premises, and in the adoption of such measures by the Federal Government as shall secure justice to this Province.

"We will give our attention to the consideration of the propriety of amending the Constitution of the Province, by vesting the powers of Legislation in one Legislative Chamber, subject nevertheless to the rights of the Crown, and under such provisions as may be deemed expedient in the interests of the People.

"We will carefully weigh any proposed changes in the Constitution and Procedure of the Supreme Court which may be submitted to us, by which Justice may be more easily and expeditiously attained than at present, and with less expense to the juror.

"The Measures relating to Inspection and Inspectorial Districts, under the Common Schools Act, to the Free Grants Act, to Trespasses upon Crown Lands, and to other important matters which may be laid before us, will receive our most careful attention.

"We thank Your Honor for directing that the Accounts of the Receipts and Expenditures for the past year, and a Detailed Statement of the Receipts and Payments of the current year, and the Estimates for the ensuing year, be laid before us.

"We join in the prayer that we may be guided by Wisdom from on High, and assure Your Honor that in all our deliberations we shall be influenced by a desire to reach by our Legislation wise and salutary results, and thereby promote the welfare of the People.

DEAR SIR—We are glad you devote a portion of your paper to the farm, garden and household. I have often heard or read of a school master that used to tell his boys, "boys, either learn something or teach something." It appears to me this is a very good motto, and each one of us ought to be striving to emulate it. Here, in New Brunswick, we have more land than money, are in a great measure depending upon mother earth for our sustenance. Now the winter is passing away, and spring drawing near, we often find ourselves in the position of those Israelites who longed for the onions and cucumbers, and fresh pots of Egypt. For animal nature, like the cattle when turned out in spring, are looking for a bite of something green, after the long winter. Well, we will strive to bring those savory cucumbers, &c., a little nearer to our mouths by a little thought and industry, or artificial means—by preparing a hot-bed or so, according to the amount of produce required. Our past experience teaches us that nothing is gained by starting hot-beds before 1st of April, in Fredericton, or the first week for starting cucumbers, tomatoes, lettuce, early cabbage, cauliflower, &c. The first thing we want is a load of two of good fermenting horse manure, (if it has a little cow manure, through it all the better.) I find from experience, it retains the heat longer. When you have secured this, have it put in some sheltered position, dry, and where you have determined to have your beds sheltered from the north and north-westerly winds. Have your manure

put in a conical heap for a week, then turn it over in a nice heap for another four days. It is ready now to make your bed. Measure by the size of your frame; build it square, 8 or 10 inches larger than the frame all round. If you build on the surface, as you proceed, beat with your fork, this is better than tramping it with the feet. It should be 2 feet front, 2 1/2 back; tilt your lights up at back an inch or so, to let off the steam for a few days. After it has regulated itself a little, sow your seed, either in boxes, or cover the bed with 6 or 8 inches of nice light earth, the surface especially fine, and small drills 2 inches apart. Give air as the weather permits; tilt the lights up at back, keep them well covered at night; we generally use spruce branches, as we have them plentiful here in Fredericton, and in all parts of New Brunswick. It will be also a good plan to lay some round the manure, as we have sometimes very cold nights in April. It will be a good time now to secure some good strong stakes for tomatoes. Now, to those that grow them, they should be 4 feet long. Use very strong ones, or you will have the pleasure of tying them up three or four times during the season. Every garden or family should have beds of herbs, they are always looked for in the fall, such as thyme, sage, mint, bahos, parsley, &c.

St. John Notes.

An eminently successful concert, given by the ladies and gentlemen composing the Cathedral choir, closed the Institute Lecture Course on Monday night.

ENTERTAINMENT.—The talent of St. Aloysius's Association, (Portland) assisted by outside friends, gave a charmingly pleasant entertainment on Wednesday evening of last week. The audience was one of the largest ever enclosed in the roomy St. Peter's Hall, this itself attesting that the young men have with them the approval of the general public. The farce of "New Brooms Sweep Clean," began the performance, all those taking part giving, as a rule, very true representations, not only of the brooms, or those who use brooms, but of the characters assumed. One of the funny features of this piece was the introduction of a Chinaman, Mr. John McCarthy appearing in that role. The dialect of Ah Sin was well imitated. The costume, too, was most appropriate, the wearer looking every inch a heathen. In fact he was some inches too much of the Chinaman, as that individual rarely attains—unlike the actor—the height of six feet. However, brevity may not in this case be the soul of wit. Selections by the society's orchestra filled the p-use that followed the closing of part first, and then began the musical portion of the programme. A full chorus sang "The Harp," passing well. Then came Mrs. Hugh Nealis, in a sparkling melody which was well received, and what was much better, excellently rendered. A reading, which no doubt the printer omitted to punctuate, was given by W. J. Mahoney. The audience were much moved—not in the direction of the door—by Mr. Hugh Campbell's fine singing of a pathetic ballad, which preceded songs by Miss Lynch, Mr. T. Daley, Miss Lizzie Morgan, Miss Colahan, and the two latter being particularly worthy piano solo, by Miss McMullin, and a pretty regimental duet, by Messrs. Jacques and Harrigan, in uniform. Messrs. D. J. D. berty and J. Berry next appeared, not to take off any character, but to take off the piano which was no longer needed. They were no encored. Graceful club swinging by Mr. John McGoldrick, although by many considered inopportune, received liberal applause, and concluded a very acceptable olio. "A Sea of Troubles,"—a farce—was the remaining attraction. Mr. P. F. Tighe created—created, for it was made from nothing, with the exception of his "make-up"—much mirth by his acting in this piece. Mr. J. H. McHugh and Mr. C. A. Powers appeared to good advantage. They did not appear to have the advantage of their parts as young men, and parts were apparently well acquainted. Much regret was evinced that Mr. Hugh did not appear in his original sketch, entitled "Boat Hire," which has won for him so much deserved notoriety.

MARRIAGES.—The extremely small number of marriages that have of late been celebrated here, furnishes important matter for reflection and comment. The average weekly number of such ceremonies rarely exceeds three, and enquiry reveals the fact that a week has sometimes passed with the formation of a single union. Should this state of affairs continue instead of our young men going West, it will be—f forbid Heaven,—our girls. There is a reason for this, which as it may be generally applicable, I will endeavour to give. The true cause, I believe, is not found in the depression of the times, but, odd as it may appear, in the too freely and too frequent mingling of the sexes. Young women forsake the joys of home for the pleasures of the street, the dance, the social party, the lodge and the numerous other places where they come in contact with the not to them, sterner sex. St. John girls who spend their evenings at home, are like girls who are ignorant of the fashions, very scarce. They are everywhere and principally, where some cases is nowhere, in the young man's mind. The good old fashioned mode of courting in the back parlor which always meant business (for the clergyman) has been discarded with bad results. When perhaps too late, girls begin to see that themselves are blamed for not

holding more aloof from the society of their opposite. Eventually the young man marries, but strange to say, not among those who have been his almost constant companions. Familiarity in their case almost breeds forgetfulness. The seeker after a wife looks around for some gentle, quiet girl who has not allowed herself to merge into what may perhaps not wrongly be called the whirl of dissipation. Failing, mayhap to find one such, he, as so many of our young men do and have done, goes from home to win the future sharer of his joys and sorrows. Confiding women may find in this brief statement of facts, some clue to their being often set aside by those on whom, by companionship, they had imagined they possessed claims.
