PRICE OF FLOUR GOES DOWN.—The
price of flour has taken a noticeable drop
during the past week, consequent upon

now selling at retail at \$6.50. Ontario
patents have fallen \$1.00 and Goldie's

\$5.75.

DIED IN THE WOODS.—William Smith
an old hunter in the Miramichi woods for
the past twenty-five years, was found
dead Saturday in a camp on the Little
South West Miramichi, forty-six miles
from Newcastle. Death seems to have
been instantaneous and without any out-
ward signs of a struggle. According to
a diary near his body he must have died
on Thursday, as it is kept up to that date.
Just before he passed away a bear enter-
ed the camp, and, although a sick man,
the hunter was able to shoot and kill the
intruder.

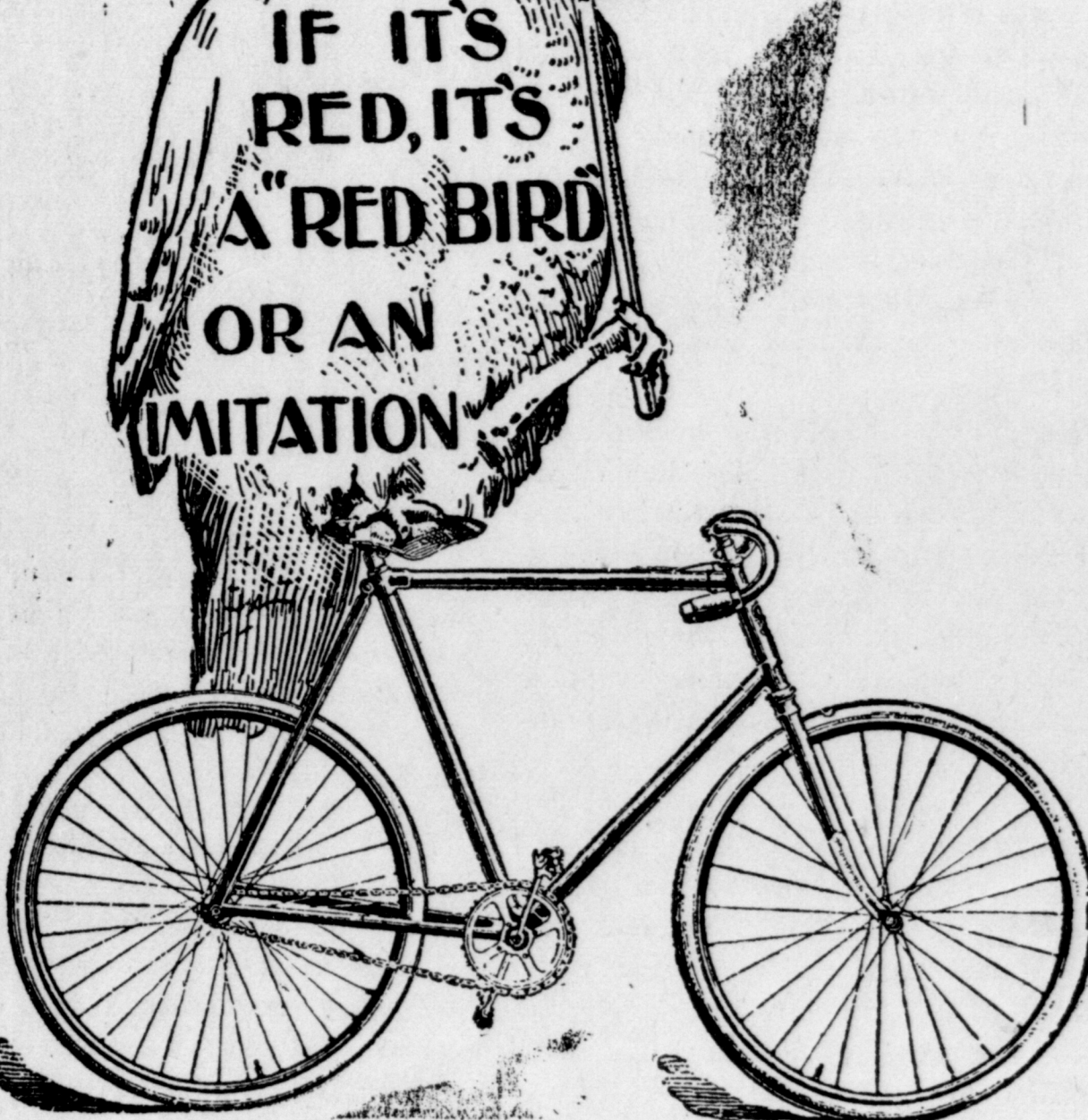
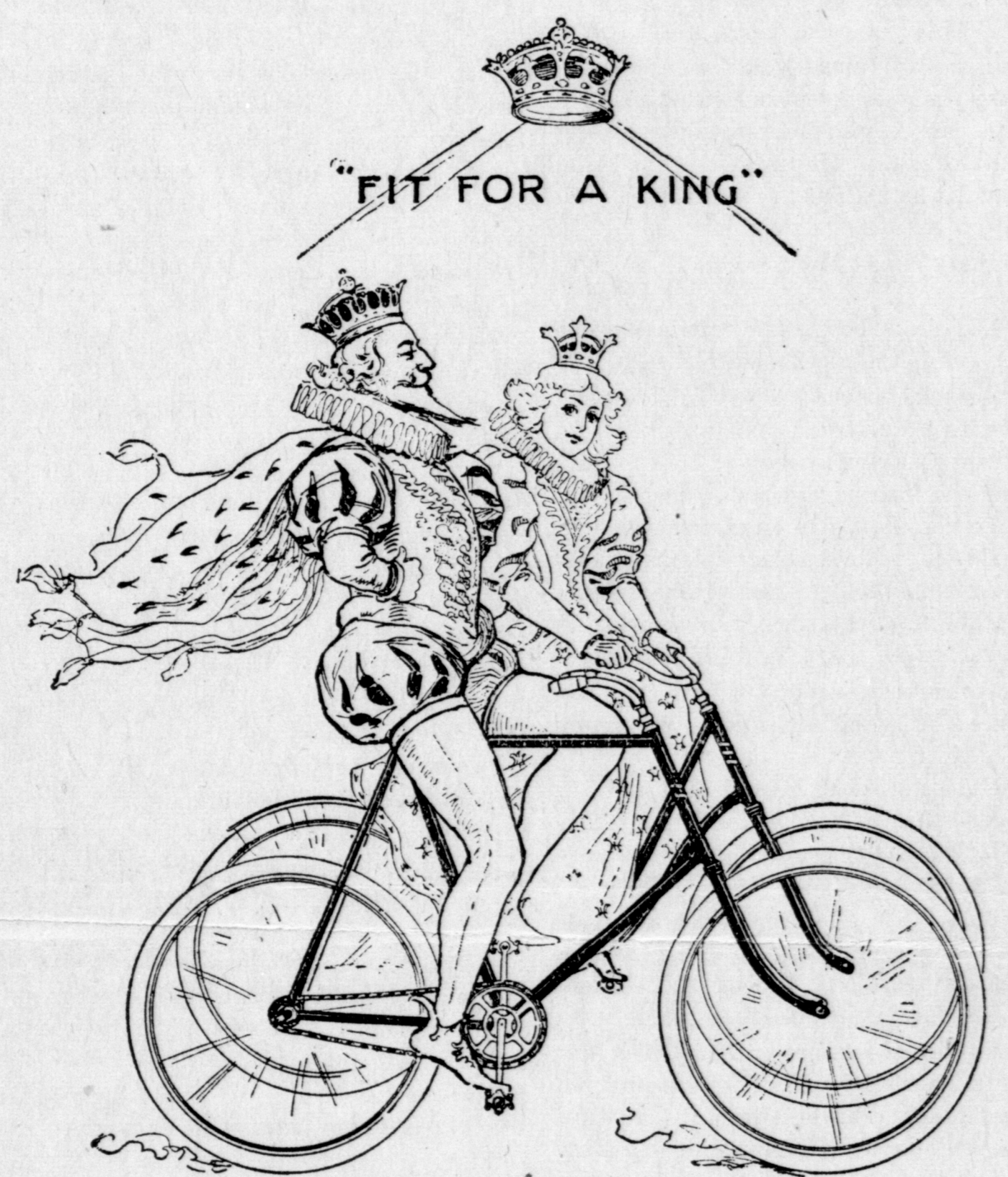
