KILL THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS.

- 1. It is at the bottom of more political corruption than any other single organization or institution.
2. Its character is such that it flourishes best where ignorance, misery and crime do most abound. Hence creates this condition of things.
3. It inculcates a disrespect for law, and thereby endangers the very structure of government by the people.
4. It destroys in the individual the finer sense of truth and right and thereby makes of its victim an easy prey to all manner of vice.
5. It robs its patrons of money, character and health, and gives nothing in return.
6. It bribes the State and stultifies public conscience by the payment of a tax or license for the privilege of continuing a business that is by all righteous thinking people branded as morally wrong.
7. Its heaviest blow falls upon the innocent who have no redress against its ravages. It dishonors womanhood, and is a crime against childhood.
8. It is the only business in this country that can be entered upon and successfully conducted without brains, character or capital, and in which there can be no honorable promotion, thus destroying not only the patrons but the keepers of the dramshops.
9. It is the headquarters for crime and criminals. It foments riots and disorders, incites strikes, and endangers public safety wherever it exists, and in consequence of this constant promotion of crime and poverty it entails untold expense upon the State in both money and manhood.
10. It is a leech that sucks the life blood of the nation, a pirate upon the business seas that lives by harpooning all honorable pursuits and callings, the acknowledged assassin of public virtue, most prolific source of criminality known to society, the monstrous horror of civilization. It is opposed to everything that is good, and in effect favors and promotes everything that is bad. The only argument it offers for the continuation of its worthless life is bribery, intimidation, and misrepresentation backed by the pistol, torch, dirk and bludgeon.
11. The demand for better homes is discounted, and their possibility is threatened by the saloon.
