In a Burning Mine. POTEAU, I. T., Dec. 13.—An explosion in the Indiana and Hiawatha mine, three miles from here, at a late hour last night, caused the death of at least five men. Twenty-five others are imprisoned in the mine, which is on fire, and it is feared that few of them can be rescued.

The disaster was caused by an explosion of gas following a blast.

Queer Divorce Laws. Although it is, happily, not possible in every country to dissolve the marriage tie because a husband has an aversion to soap or because a wife has a tongue more active than her fingers, there is a ludicrous facility in many lands for getting rid of an undesirable wife or husband.

In Greece, a wife to maintain her position, must be the very "pink of propriety;" and if she goes to theatre or race meeting, or even dines with a friend, without her husband's sanction, he may send her back to her mother and bid her stay there.

Time was, and not long ago, in Crete, when a man might divorce his wife if she appeared likely to add too many quivers to his bow; and in Russia, if husband and wife wished to part for any reason whatever, all they need do was to adjourn to some public place, and in the presence of onlookers tear a strip of muslin in two.

In Morocco it is not fashionable to be attached too long to any particular wife, and a man's social position may be gauged by the number of wives he has divorced.

It is quite common for a man to have married and parted from a score of wives before he has reached the age at which the average Englishman thinks it prudent to marry.

In France, during the "time of terror," the daring experiment was tried of allowing divorces at will and without any assigned cause. The results were disastrous or happy according to the point of view; for within a year 4000 couples agreed to part in Paris alone, and within a short time there were actually more divorces than marriages every year.

It is interesting to speculate how many so-called happy unions would be dissolved in England if such a sweeping change were introduced into our laws. The advantage of the system was that a man might remarry his wife if a penitent mood supervened; and the result was that many couples were married and divorced several times before they fully made-up their minds.

In Japan, if an oblique-eyed beauty gives too much rein to her tongue "off she goes," to learn that a discreet reticence is a virtue in a wife.

In Germany if the wife uses her husband purse too freely he can keep the purse to himself, and bid her go, while he looks out for a fraulein of simpler tastes.

In Australia a man can divorce a wife who is too fond of her cups, or rather glasses; and no Chinaman is called upon to tolerate a shrew.

From the oldest times divorce has been in some countries almost as simple a matter as untying a shoe lace.

In ancient Rome, a man who wearied of his wife could free himself by the simple process of telling her so.

In Biblical history, too, we learn that Abraham divorced a Hagar by providing her bread and a bottle of water and sending her away.



HOG CHOLERA REMEDY. Dr. Salmon's Successful Use of Immune Serum.

After experiments extending over a period of 20 years and the expenditure of many thousands of dollars the United States government is at last combating successfully those most pernicious diseases, hog cholera and swine plague.

The results obtained by the bureau of animal industry of the agricultural department, especially during the last year, have been highly satisfactory, and the scientists who have devoted so much time and labor to the work feel amply repaid for their efforts.

The discovery of a serum which renders hogs immune from the ravages of cholera and plague is an important one. It means a great deal to one of the foremost American industries, and the benefits arising from it are almost incalculable.

The propagation of the serum requires the use of many animals. At the experiment station, where it is made, there are donkeys, cows, calves, mules and horses, all patiently submit-



ting to the process of inoculation and blood drawing. Strange as it may appear, not a single hog is used in making the antitoxin fluid which is such a blessing to his family. Hogs have not been found well adapted to the purpose for which the government uses the other animals. Donkeys are the favorites with the experimenters.

The station at Bethesda, Md., eight miles from Washington, is a unique institution. On the well kept farm there are dozens of horses and mules that are strangers to the plow and harness. There are cows whose days for giving milk are over, and whose lives, in the eyes of the scientist, are devoted to higher objects. The farm is presided over by Dr. Ernest C. Schroeder, a man who, although still young, has made a name in the scientific world.

Dr. D. E. Salmon, chief of the bureau of animal industry, says: "We have used serum on 1,000 animals this year and have saved over 80 per cent of herds treated. While the treatment was going on observations were made of 1,100 hogs in other herds not treated for the lack of serum, and 80 per cent died. Last year the percentage of hogs saved out of 240 treated was 75, while in other herds not treated 85 per cent died.

This is a great achievement for the bureau of animal industry, and attracts new attention to its noted chief, who was born in Morris county, N. J., July 23, 1850. He entered Cornell university at its opening and graduated in 1875 with the degree of bachelor of veterinary science. That same year he went to France and studied for two terms at the famous Alfort Veterinary school.

The appropriation by congress in 1878 of \$10,000 for the investigation of animal diseases led to the appointment of several veterinarians, including Dr. Salmon, who was called from the position of non-resident lecturer on veterinary science in the University of Georgia. In 1879 New York state attempted to stamp out contagious pleuropneumonia, and Dr. Salmon was appointed on the veterinary staff as an assistant to Professor Law. Here he did excellent service, and afterward made a thorough examination of the south Atlantic seaboard, accurately outlining permanently infected districts.

Early in 1883 he was called to Washington by Commissioner Loring to establish a veterinary division in the department of agriculture. Within a year congress passed an act establishing the bureau of animal industry, Dr. Salmon being appointed chief, a position which he at present holds.

During his term of service a large number of investigations have been made under his direction. In 1883 he was appointed by President Arthur a member of the commission to investigate the quality of American pork products and the prevalence of trichiniasis, his report on the subject being received as conclusive and unquestionable. In addition to the exhaustive labors attached to the bureau of animal industry Dr. Salmon has also charge of the quarantine of imported animals.

As a recognition of his efforts on behalf of veterinary science, Dr. Salmon had recently conferred upon him the degree of honorary association by the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons of Great Britain, the highest professional honor which that institution can bestow.

He is also a fellow of the American Association For the Advancement of Science and chairman of the committee on animal diseases and animal foods of the American Public Health association.
