Saved From Drowning By a Brave Little Girl.

A boat full of small children, all under nine years of age, were having a good time on the 10th inst, sailing around the wharf at the Narrows, when a little four year old child, Mildred French fell overboard. Mr. Samuel Wilson plunged into the water and struck out for the child but failed to reach her. The mill hands run to the rescue but could do nothing. While all this was going on Mr. Theo. Sharp's twelve year old daughter Estella and her little brother Fred of Grand Lake were laboring under great difficulties trying to row their boat toward the scene of the accident. They having but one thoulpin could not make much headway. Estella, however, did not grow discouraged but worked and cried in her endeavours to rescue the little one. At last after about ten minutes, to the great delight of the people the brave little lady came up alongside the children's boat, climbed over, and just as the child was going down for the last time she reached down under the water and caught her by the hand and with great difficulty pulled her into the boat. It was anxious time and doubtless many a prayer went up for Heaven to aid in the rescue. If Estella does not deserve a medal from the Humane Society, nobody does.

The Baptist Convention.

Amherst, N. S., Aug. 20.—The fifty third annual meeting of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces was opened in the house of worship of the Amherst Baptist church this day at 10 o'clock a. m., Rev. E. M. Kierstead Ph. D., president, in the chair. The hymn "I love Thy Kingdom Lord," was sung. Rev. W. T. Stackhouse, of Vancouver, B. C., read Psalm 102, and prayer was said by Rev. J. C. Spurr, of P. E. Island. The secretary read the list of delegates, and the following brethren were invited to seats in the convention: Revs. Calvin Goodspeed, D. D., McMaster University; Geo. Churchill and Mrs. Church, Ill, India; H. Morrow, China; W. T. Stackhouse, B. C.; Rev. Mr. McGreggor, Presbyterian pastor Amherst; James Grant, Pittsfield, Mass.

McN Parker, Halifax, resigning, on account of ill-health, from the boards of ministerial aid and relief and annuity funds; also from F. H. Eaton, of British Columbia, on account of removal from Nova Scotia, resigning membership of board of governors of Acadia University; C. F. Clitch and Rev. E. E. Daley, resigning from foreign mission board. As a result of ballot Rev. H. B. Hinson, by an overwhelming majority, was elected president of the convention for the ensuing year. He was received with hearty applause, but positively declined the position. Rev. J. C. Spurr was then elected president by acclamation.

The retiring president delivered his address. He referred to denominational problems, home missions, associations, ordinations, work of the local church, forward movement, fund for Acadia College. He then announced as the subject of his address, "The Divine Message and Divine Mission of the Church." In developing the divine message, he claimed, the Bible contains truths for all mankind. But to be developed in its applications to the life of the times by the church of to-day it will not do to preach a system of theology which is the result of thinking past generations. The preaching today must cast truth into the forms of thought now current. We need not be afraid of new theology. He spoke of study of sociology and philanthropy, and he made a strong plea for a large vote in favor of prohibition.
