MEAT DIET.

One of the Greatest Dietary Sins of the Present Age.

Writing in The North American Review for June, Dr. Charles W. Purdy traces a large portion of the diseases and early deaths of the American middle classes to the eating of flesh-meat.

The well-to-do American has butcher's meat served with every meal and the most of the food that a man and a woman will consume when thus regularly spread before him on practically all occasions represents to his excretory organs a tax in its disposal that is physiologically prodigious.

Speaking of the ill effects traceable to the excessive use of flesh-meat, Dr. Purdy mentions "premature hardening of the arteries, enfeebling all those dangers from arterial hemorrhage, of which apoplexy is the type, and in addition early impeding nutrition, so that the most energetic old men are unable to do their work."

Electricity cured plants.

The agricultural department of the Cornell University recently published the results of some experiments extending over a period of six years upon the effect of the light of the electric arc lamp upon the growth of plants.

It is stated in this respect that Mr. W. M. Rawson of Arlington, now uses electric light in the commercial forcing of lettuce, of which he is a leading producer.

Mr. Rawson finds that he obtains a gain of five days per crop during the winter, which makes a gain of nearly three weeks for the three crops during the winter.

Professor Bailey's experiments at Cornell confirm those of Mr. Rawson, as he states that he finds many plants grow more rapidly when under the influence of electric light at night.

Mr. Rawson says, that the light can be used in forcing certain plants.

A useless struggle.

We believe that very little opposition was encountered by the old horse railroads, on the part of their car drivers when the electric traction was introduced, and that the men themselves hailed the change with delight as relieving them of a good deal of labor and the worry of keeping a pair of brutes up to schedule time.

Reasoning by analogy, therefore, one would imagine that the car drivers would view with similar approval the introduction of electric cabs, but if we are to judge by recent events in London, such is not the case.

In fact, at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the London cab trade council, in which the question of electric cabs came up for discussion recently, a resolution was read expressing disapproval of the introduction of electric cabs on the streets of London.

The position in which the London cab trade places itself is evidently little short of indignant.

To imagine for one moment that the tide of progress can be stemmed by any such resolution is the height of shortsighted folly.

If electric or any other automobile cabs can be operated more cheaply and with greater comfort on the riding public, they will be adopted, and their increasing number seems to point strongly in this direction.
