Fatal Railroad Collision.

NEW YORK, June 13.—A score of wounded from a wreck of trains on the Long Island railroad, are at St. James Hospital, Long Island City, and one of them is expected to die today. His name is Robert Fox, brakeman, five of the other injured are in a serious condition. At least thirty were hurt in the disaster. The wonder is that many were not killed.

It was a rear end collision, and it occurred at Goose Creek station on the Rockaway division of the railway. A locomotive attached to two cars of a special train on which was a bridal party ran into the rear car of a regular train as the latter was leaving the station bound for New York last night at 10.50. The special locomotive and the rear car of the regular train was wrecked and the first and second car of the regular train telescoped each other.
