

LIVERPOOL TIMBER MARKET, Nov. 3.—NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA FIR PLANKS, BOARDS, &c.—St. John, with cargo, have been sold at £6 to £6 10s. per standard, but in the cargo higher prices being demanded, several cargoes have been yarded; two cargoes of Richibucto have been sold at £7 2s. 6d. and one, not so good, half Spruce and Yellow and chiefly three inch Battens, at £7 per standard; Prince Edward's Island, in cargo, at £6 15s. to £6 17s. 6d. and St. John, by auction at £7 10s to £7 17s. 6d. per standard; a cargo of Shippegan yellow Deals has been sold at £8 2s. 6d. per standard.—RAILWAY SLEEPERS are very unsaleable, indeed buyers can scarcely be got to entertain the question of a purchase at all, and importers are, therefore, obliged to yard them.—A small cargo of various dimensions, mixed Hackmatack and Red Pine, is reported to have been sold at 2s 2d each.—LATHWOOD: St. John and Quebec have been sold with cargo at 20s to 60s. per fathom, and apart at £5 to £5 10 per fathom.

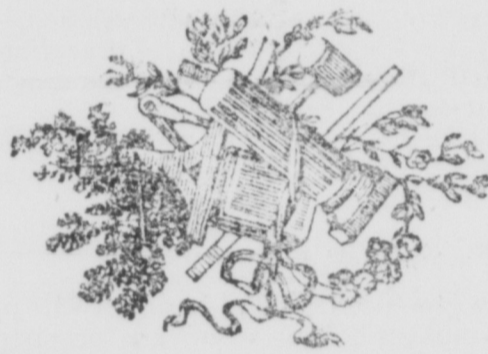
