The Editor of the *Reporter* certainly deserves credit for the ingenuity he displays in his efforts to make it appear that those who may differ with, and have the temerity to oppose anything he may advance, distort the meaning he intended to convey, and then by a partial reply to a query and a small dash of personality clearing himself of the general charge. In his last, he says that he is unconscious of the assumption of a degree of superiority with which we charge him. If the paragraph in his paper of the 24th ult. does not contain a sneer at the want of "knowledge or ability" on the part of the "writer" in the *Sentinel*, to discuss the matter in hand as ably as himself, then we cannot read or understand the English language; lest he should remain unconscious of the fact, we recommend him to refresh his memory by a perusal of the paragraph in question.

We repeat it is most extraordinary that if the principles of Orangism, and our contemporary's political views so exactly coincide, he should be so bitterly opposed to Orangism as he has been, and should treat with contempt the commemoration of the day which completed the work of Protestant deliverance from the thralldom of Popery, and at the same time, according to our contemporary, established the peculiar political principles he advocates; this is what he has not yet made plain to our benighted understanding. We really hope he will not lose his temper, when we inform him, as we now do, that we most emphatically deny that we have violated our professed principles, in treating this question as we have done. We do not intend that the *Sentinel* shall ever advocate the interests of any mere political party; it is devoted to a higher, broader, and a holier work. We take our stand on the broad basis of Protestantism and of the Bible. If in guarding the interests of that faith for which our fathers suffered persecution and paid the penalty of their lives, we chance to oppose the sentiments of any party or any journal, it will be because the doctrines advanced by that party or journal come within the field of our labours. Our contemporary must bear with us a little longer, while we tell him that we do not intend to claim the "benefit of our youth," in any discussion that may arise between us, nor are we conscious of having done so; but as he claimed so much superiority, we, as the young ought always to do, yielded to his greater wisdom; at the same time, we thought he could not do less than satisfy our boyish curiosity by answering one or two little queries which we put to him; and when he has done this, we shall, perhaps, childlike, have one or two more for him to explain. In the meantime, although we do not intend to go to Jericho, or any such outlandish place, for the benefit of our beard, yet having obtained a supply of butter, we hope by a liberal application of it, and with the assistance of an ancient Grimalkin, whose services we have retained, to raise stubble enough to give our contemporary a chance to shave us, without being in danger of cutting his fingers, as it must be dreadfully annoying to him, to be always wounding himself instead of annihilating his inferiors in "knowledge or ability." In conclusion, we can assure the Editor of the *Reporter* that we had not the slightest intention of being uncourteous to any one, particularly to him, for whom we have a great deal of respect, but a faithful *Sentinel* must not allow his personal feelings to cause him to swerve from his duty.

THE CHOLERA IN BANGOR.—We are informed that on Monday week, five deaths from Cholera were reported at the City Marshal's office in Bangor; on Tuesday evening, nine deaths were reported; but on Wednesday morning, at nine o'clock, only one death had occurred during the previous twelve hours, so that there is reason to hope that the epidemic is decreasing.

We clip the following paragraph from the London Times, of the 6th ult.; the iron referred to, is we believe, the product of the iron works in this place.

"Our Liverpool correspondent, writing on Saturday, communicates the fact of an importation into the port of Liverpool from North America of a novel character. Hitherto it has been the rule that iron has been imported into the north-western continent from England; but now

the practice is in one instance reversed, and although the amount of ore received in the present instance is comparatively small, the event is not less interesting and suggestive. The importation consists of 150 tons of iron, wood manufactured, and which is described as being of a very superior quality. The mines whence the sample has been received are described as extensive, rich, and abundant in ore, of a quality superior to that dug in North Staffordshire, and the parties interested are now engaged, or about to engage, in more minute experiments touching the qualities of the ore. For this purpose machinery is to be exported, and, it is said, that not only do the specimens received promise a special adaption to conversion into steel, but that the product in a state of iron will compete powerfully, if not triumphantly, in the United States, with that exported from this country. The sample, our correspondent states, is still on shipboard in the *Mercy*. We do not of course engage in the expectations mentioned; we mention the fact as one likely to interest an important branch of mining industry in this island."

RULES FOR THE GUIDANCE OF COMPETITORS.

1st.—No person will be allowed to compete except a member who has paid his subscription before the 13th of October, and in no case will a member be allowed to offer as his own the property of another.

2nd.—All Stock, Grain, Manufactures, &c., must be grown, raised or manufactured in the County, and must be entered with the Secretary previous to the day of exhibition, who will furnish each Competitor with a numbered Card (corresponding with the entry in his Book) which must be permanently attached to the article exhibited, and the premiums will be awarded to the numbers.

3rd.—Cattle pens, and other arrangements for the safe keeping of Stock will be prepared on the ground previous to the time of exhibition, and Halters or ropes must be furnished by the owners of Horses or Neat cattle, that they may be tied securely; a Committee will be in attendance to arrange their position as well as that of the other articles presented for competition, wherein they must remain until the close of the exhibition. Stock must be on the ground by half-past nine o'clock, A. M.

4th.—Persons competing on the largest quantity and best quality of Grain or other crops raised on a given quantity of Land, must produce not less than two bushels at the exhibition, also an affidavit made by the Competitor and another responsible person that the measurement of Land and quantity of crop mentioned is correct, and that the sample presented is a fair one.

5th.—Written statements will be required from the successful Competitor as to the mode of cultivating, time of sowing, and quantity of seed sown.

6th.—Competent and impartial Judges will be appointed, who will commence their examination at half-past ten o'clock, A. M., and their decision will be final.

7th.—The Judges will be instructed not to award a premium where they consider the animal or article deficient in merit.

8th.—Special premiums will be awarded upon Manufactures or Implements of Husbandry not specified in the above list, should such be offered, which in the opinion of the judges are worthy of encouragement.
