The Steamer Reindeer arrived here on Saturday afternoon, having made the run from Fredericton in ten hours, including stoppages. She is beautifully fitted up, and bids fair to become very popular. She will run twice a week between St. John and Woodstock, as long as the water is high enough.

ACCIDENT.—A sad accident, resulting in the loss of life occurred at Betsey's Rapids, a few miles below this village on Monday the 4th inst. The Tow Boat, belonging to Mr. David Raymond, having on board a quantity of stone for the Foundry and some goods, capsized while passing through the rapids, and we regret to add a man named Isaac Stickney was drowned.

We learn, by the St. Andrews' Standard, that there is a prospect of an Engineer being employed on that end of the line, and that satisfactory accounts have been received from England by the Directors. It is therefore highly probable that this work will now be carried on with fresh vigour.

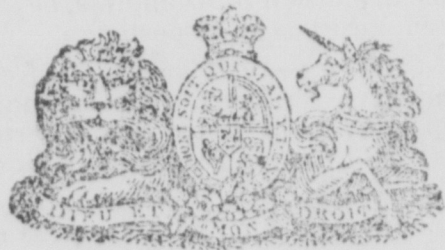
