PROSPECTUS
OF THE

British American Chronicle

And General Weekly Recorder,

A New Journal, proposed to be established in the City of Montreal; and intended among its special objects, to draw closer the bonds of Connection between Canada and the Sister Provinces; to advocate all necessary, well weighed Reforms; yet repudiate unadvised "Annexation," in whatever form; and preserve unalloyed the mutually beneficial relation hitherto happily existing between the Mother Country and her North American Colonies.

THE shrewd remark of the Poet, that—

"There is a tide in the affairs of Men,
Which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune,"

has become, in a manner, an axiom as regards human affairs,—whether applied to the interests of individuals or of Nations; and such, in the humble estimation of the Writer of the following Sketch, is this position of BRITISH AMERICA at this moment. The reckless conduct of the present Canadian Ministry, in pandering to the schemes of an Un-British Democratic Faction, and fostering a spirit of antagonism to BRITISH CONNECTION, and BRITISH FEELING, has unwittingly created a most powerful Counterpoise, which, judiciously applied, may, like the lever desired by Archimedes, be made to move the world. That potent lever as regards British Ascendancy in Canada, is the lately successfully organized BRITISH AMERICAN LEAGUE.

Cordially acquiescing in the well-weighed conclusions at which that highly honorable, prudent, and influential popular Convention has arrived,—namely, the promotion of "a Union of all the British American Provinces," opposed to "Annexation,"—every reasonable "Retrenchment and Economy in the Public Expenditure," consistent with efficiency in the different Departments,—and reasonable "Protection to Home Industry," in lieu of grasping at that unsubstantial and delusive phantom, "Free Trade,"—we rejoice at being able to avail ourselves of so auspicious a moment for carrying into effect a long meditated project of putting forth a COLONIAL WEEKLY JOURNAL, upon a rather extended basis, devoted more especially to the advocacy of the above great leading objects, but at the same time intended to serve as a periodical vehicle for once concentrating and disseminating whatever other useful intelligence and information may be deemed mutually interesting and desirable, throughout the whole of the British American Provinces.

Under shelter of this preliminary observation, it is ventured to submit to the favourable attention of the British American Public at large, the following brief outline of the plan of a new Weekly Journal, proposed to be published in Montreal, for special circulation throughout British North America, and intended to be the patriotic medium of encouraging and exciting a more intimate and cordial common feeling of British Nationality than at present exists, among the inhabitants of the different Provinces into which that extensive and important Region is subdivided.

The Journal is to be intitled "THE BRITISH AMERICAN CHRONICLE AND GENERAL WEEKLY RECORDER," and to consist of eight (four column) pages about the same size as the New York Tribune.

The contents to be divided into four distinct departments, to be arranged as follow:—The first two pages to be generally devoted to British or American Literature, and interesting extracts from select recent works, and particularly from those bearing on the Colonies. The next two to be allotted to condensed Parliamentary Reports, and miscellaneous intelligence from the different British American Provinces, arranged under the respective heads of Upper and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward's Island, and Newfoundland. The following two to be generally set apart for Editorial matter, and Original Correspondence; leaving space sufficient for University, Church Naval, and Military intelligence; and a list of the principal Births, Deaths, and Marriages. The seventh page to contain the most recent Commercial and Agricultural Reports,—embracing the latest Shipping Intelligence at the different Ports; the state of the crops and weather in various quarters; Tables of the Average rates of the chief Staple Commodities, and a comparative view of the wholesale and retail market prices (including grain, cattle, household supplies, &c.) in the different Provinces, as well as in the neighboring States; together with a weekly Financial Summary, giving the latest average prices of Bank, Railroad, and other Stock, the rates of Exchange, and other particulars. And the last page to be expressly allotted to Advertisements and Notices to Correspondents.

In addition to the above brief outline, it may be advisable to state, in a few words, that, in accordance with its Conductors' unswerving Political Creed, the guiding spirit of THE BRITISH AMERICAN CHRONICLE will be free and independent, yet thoroughly CONSERVATIVE and BRITISH; but at the same time evince every respect and kindly feeling towards our fellow subjects of French origin, whom he has ever ardently desired to see elevated—not depressed—by their ingratitude on British Stock; that its Columns will, therefore, be open to the temperate discussion of all subjects within its sphere, with due regard to the justice of the old maxim—"Audi alteram partem;" and that, bearing in mind the value of observing the "smaller in modo," along with the "fortiter in re" wherever it shall see cause for disagreeing with contemporaries, on matters of politics, opinion, or facts, or statements alleged to be such, the tone of its dissent will ever be as far removed from the unmitigated flat contradiction and coarse personal abuse at present so prevalent, as the dignified language of the well-bred gentleman ought to be from that of the vulgar bully.

Having so far avowed our plans, principles and feelings, and, after a month's deliberation thrown down the amicable gauntlet to BRITISH AMERICAN PUBLIC at large, we rest content with adding, that the Price will be kept as low as possible; that, should sufficient encouragement be received from the different Provinces, and that the First Number will appear in the course of next month, and that the rest will depend on the amount of Patronage extended to the undertaking.
