

**BUFFALO, MAY 7.**—Another Steamboat disaster, and great loss of life.—The British steamers, Dispatch and Commerce, came in collision last night, near Port Mantland, on the Canada side of Lake Erie. The Commerce sunk in eight fathoms of water. She was transporting a portion of the 33d Regiment of British troops, twenty-four of whom were drowned—also one officer and eleven passengers—thirty-eight in all.

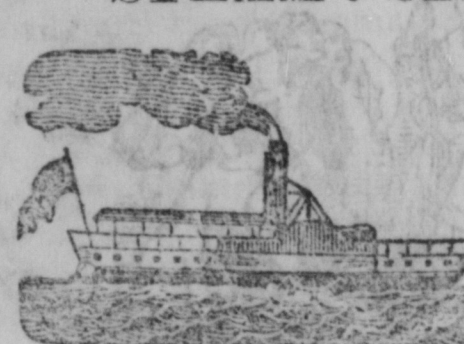
