

STEAMER CARLETON.—We have been requested to state that the Steamer Carleton will leave Woodstock on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings at 7 o'clock, and discharge her freight for St. John into a Boat to leave Fredericton for that place on the same days at 12 o'clock.

Freight or passengers leaving here on any of these mornings can be in St. John the same evening; and freight for Woodstock shipped in St. John on Monday's, Wednesday's or Friday's, will be discharged into the Carleton on its arrival in Fredericton, and landed here on Tuesday, Thursday, or Saturday.

The Editor of the *Head Quarters* says he is informed from a source on which he can rely, that 40,000 bushels of various kinds of bread stuffs have been raised last year in the County of Carleton, beyond the wants of its inhabitants. We are under the necessity of informing that gentleman that his information is far from being correct; we do not deny that a considerable quantity of surplus produce was raised, but whoever gave the information referred to, was not very well informed on the subject himself. We will be enabled in a few days, to state with a tolerable degree of certainty, the quantity to be disposed of, when we will set our friend right in the matter.

DISTRESSING OCCURRENCE.—As Mr. Walter Britt and his son, a lad of 14 years of age, were coming down the Tobique River, on a one horse sled, on the morning of the 25th of April, the horse and sled suddenly broke through the ice. Mr. Britt succeeded in gaining a footing for himself, and turned round to give assistance to his son, but melancholy to relate, no trace of him could be discovered, he, together with the horse and sled, had disappeared under the ice.

DESPATCH.—The Fredericton papers are praising up the great speed of their River Boats! They deserve it, and we can bear testimony to the fact. The Reporter published in Fredericton on the 3d, was received at the Post Office here, (by the Reindeer) before dark on the evening of the 9th.

THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL AND THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—We have a hint from Fredericton, that His Excellency's speech at the close of the Session was a regular bomb-shell among the Executive Councillors, some of whom were exceedingly annoyed, and 'looked daggers.' Taking it in the sense His Excellency meant, and as the Executive Councillors understood it, the closing speech is about as neat a 'box on the ear,' as ever an impudent and idle school boy was honoured with. One hon. Councillor we are told, positively refused to go up to Government House with an Address; while another who did go up, came back with evident indications of having had a thorough wagg. In short there are strong symptoms of wide difference between the 'Head' and the 'limbs' of the Government! Sir Edmund, as a man of business, must be greatly shocked at the ridiculous position he has been left in by his Council. They made him promise everything in his opening speech; they could carry none of the measures they proposed; because, as a body, neither the country or the Legislature, had any confidence in them. Instead of resigning as they ought to have done, the moment they failed in one of the measures to which they were pledged by the speech, they held on until the end of the Session, and ended no where. What a curious explanation Sir Edmund will have to give to his superiors, of the trickery of his Council!—*Miramichi Gleaner.*

FIRE IN PORTLAND!—Shortly before 1 o'clock on Wednesday, a fire broke out in the house belonging to Mr. John Weeks, in Portland. A strong wind prevailing from the south west, the flames spread very rapidly, and in a short time they communicated to the adjoining house, owned by John Pollok, Esq., and occupied by Mr. Campbell; thence to two houses owned by Mr. Connelly, and the sheds adjoining, all of which were consumed. The Volunteer Fire Companies were early on the ground, and exerted themselves to the utmost to subdue the fire; and through their instrumentality it was eventually got under. The Methodist Chapel was in imminent danger, but the plentiful supply of water obtained from the harbor, the tide being nearly full at the time, and the exertions of several indefatigable individuals who were on the roof of the building, fortunately saved it, and consequently the buildings near by, from destruction. The Hon. Charles Simonds dwelling, opposite, was considerably scorched. The Volunteer Engine Companies, Nos. 2, 3, and 5, were worked admirably, and they deserve the greatest credit. The volunteer system works well, and the officers and men of these Companies have more than once saved a large amount of property from destruction. Mr. Pollok's Engine also did service. We understand there is no insurance on any of the buildings destroyed.—*New Brunswick.*

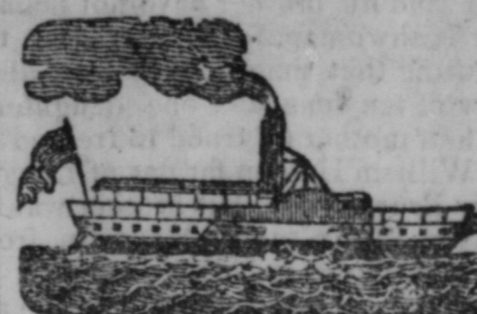
