

Mr. John O'Connell has written a letter to the repeaters of Ireland, asking them if he is to keep open Conciliation Hall any longer; he is quite discouraged, and says he can do no more.

FRANCE.

The *Moniteur* contradicts a statement which appeared in some of the Paris journals, to the effect that it was the intention of the French Government to reduce the naval force in the West Indies, and to withdraw the Governor General.

It is stated, in the best informed quarters in Paris, that the question between the Spanish and English Governments is settled, the Spanish Cabinet having agreed to accept the terms proposed by Lord Palmerston. The news was brought to Paris on Thursday afternoon by the Belgian Cabinet courier, who arrived from Madrid, and who set out for Brussels the same evening.

The price of corn in France continues to fall, and is at the present moment lower than it has been for many years.

THE POPE.

There has been an idle report circulated that the Pope, having left Portici, for the Papal States, travelling by easy journeys on land, had been poisoned at Caserta. His Holiness is alive and in perfect health; but, although he has certainly set out from Portici, it does not seem quite so certain that he will go to Rome. Bologna is still pointed out by some as his final destination. A few days will solve the present uncertainty.

GREECE.

The Greek affair makes but little progress. Even Mr. Anstey, the foremost antagonist of Lord Palmerston, admits the propriety of our claims on Greece, and "that it would have been a disgrace" if we had neglected to press them. Every one, except King Otho and a few London journals, sees the matter in the same light. The latest accounts give hopes that the affair will shortly be settled. It is absurd to suppose that we shall allow a fleet to remain long at Athens, whilst King Otho is making up his mind, and playing the occult game of Russia.

ROME.

The *Costituzionale*, of the 2nd instant, states that the splendid illuminations and other matters which were in preparation at Rome for the reception of the Pope have been suspended, it having been learned that his Holiness's return is deferred, Austria having counselled Pius IX. to postpone his entry into Rome till the question of the ecclesiastical privileges in Piedmont is settled.

Some of the French troops were preparing to leave Rome on the 1st for Velletri, in order to do honour to the Pope. Doubts are still entertained whether his Holiness will at present return to the Imperial city.

Letters from Rome, of the 2nd instant, state that the triumphal arch erected at Ballerina in honour of the Pope's return, had been burned during the night. The Austrian General in command at Bologna had adopted measures of extraordinary precaution, which are ascribed to indications of hostile feeling to the Austrians by the people of Bologna.

We are sorry to state that during the height of the freshet last week, the water which had overflowed the bank where Mr. Baker's foundry is situated, forced a passage underneath that building and carried away the foundation on which the floor timbers rested, causing the floor with nearly the whole contents of the foundry to fall through into the water below; the engine and furnace were thrown out of place and will both have to be taken down, fifty or sixty moulds prepared for casting, all the tools used in the foundry and shop, and a considerable quantity of iron castings and other articles lie buried in water and rubbish.

Mr. Baker estimates his loss at £100.

REMOVAL.—The office of the "Carleton Sentinel" has been removed to the second flat of the corner building (near the Maduxnakik bridge) belonging to the estate of J. M. Connell Esq. Our recent migration must be an apology for any seeming negligence in this impression.

We notice a rather curious typographical error in the British Colonist of the 1st inst., in a paragraph respecting the Liverpool Timber Market it says:—"Slaves, which are now arriving in abundance from the United States, must necessarily fall in price."

STEAM BOATS.—The Citizens of Woodstock were enlivened on Saturday evening last, by hearing (for the first time this season) the dulcet tones of the *Carleton's Whistle*.

The *Reindeer* arrived yesterday at 2 o'clock, having made the run from Fredericton in about 9 hours; and a little before three the *Forest Queen* made her appearance. The *Carleton* left yesterday morning, the *Forest Queen* yesterday at 4 1-2 o'clock, and the *Reindeer* this morning at 5.

CANADA.—**COLONEL PRINCE'S LETTER.**—We copy today from a Canadian paper, another letter from Col Prince; and observe that some of the Colonial journals announce these letters as favourable to annexation. Not so: they advocate a union of the Colonies independent of the Mother country, "not to overthrow England or fight against her, but rather to be aiding and assisting unto her." He does not seek to increase the strength of a rival nation, nor to transfer his allegiance—but to be free. And is it to be wondered at, that many of the people would be disgusted at the anti-British doings of the Canadian Ministry? Is it to be supposed that the people will sit quiet-

ly by and fold their arms, while the Government were passing unjust measures, notwithstanding the strongest remonstrances from those whose privilege and right was to remonstrate against them. Ill treat and punish good men, and they will become bad men. The present Ministry of Canada are known to have entertained similar opinions to those for which they cause their political opponents to be punished. Colonel Prince is a man of undoubted loyalty—with him loyalty is a passion—with the Canadian Ministry it is a necessity.—*Standard*.

POSTSCRIPT.

ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA.

We received the English news, (by the *Canada*) just as we were going to press, we have only room for a few extracts.

The British Ministry have suffered another defeat, making the 4th in about a week.

The Pope entered Rome on the 12th April, at four o'clock. He was received with the most enthusiastic acclamations by vast numbers of the people, who went out to meet him.

The differences between England and Greece are considered as settled.

The general tone of Commercial affairs remain without improvement.

IRELAND.—The County of Donegal is in a bad state; in almost every part of it an organized system of ribbonism prevails.

The *Limerick Chronicle* states that upwards of 5000 persons have left that district since January last to proceed to America.

FRANCE.—A frightful catastrophe has occurred at Angers. The third battalion of the 11th Regiment were marching across the suspension bridge which leads into the town, when the bridge broke down and about 600 men armed with bayonets and sabres, were plunged into the river, upwards of 300 are known to have perished.
