JANUARY TERM, 1850.

ORDERED that any person or persons, who shall or may ride, or drive, any horse mare or gelding, in any carriage, sleigh sled or other vehicle, or on horseback, over, upon, or along any of the side-walks or promenades, now laid down or hereafter to be laid down, in that part of the Parish of Woodstock, affected by the act of the General Assembly, made and passed in the ninth year of the reign of her present Majesty, intituled, "an Act to provide for the repair of the streets and highways in part of the Parish of Woodstock," shall forfeit and pay, for each and every offence, a sum not less than five shillings, nor more than ten shillings, with costs of prosecution, to be sued for and recovered, in manner provided for by the twelfth section of the above mentioned act.
