HAVING received Her Majesty's Writ, dated the thirty first day of May last, for the Election of two able and discreet persons to represent this County in the General Assembly of the Province, I do in obedience thereto hereby proclaim and give Public Notice, that a Court will be held by me at the County Court House in Woodstock, on SATURDAY the 15th day of June, inst., at 10 o'clock, A. M., for the purpose of the said Election, of which all persons will take notice and govern themselves accordingly; and in case a Poll shall be then and there demanded, I do hereby further proclaim and give Public Notice that Polling Booths will be opened on Thursday the 20th day of June, inst., at 8 o'clock, A. M., and continue open until 4 o'clock, P. M. of the same day, at the following places, viz:

DISTRICT No. 1.—To comprize the Freeholders of the Front Tier of Lots in the Parish of Woodstock, and the whole Parish of Northampton, and who shall assemble at the Court House, in the Shire Town.

DISTRICT No. 2.—To comprize the remaining part of the Parish of Woodstock, and the Freeholders shall assemble at the place commonly called Richmond Corner.

DISTRICT No. 3.—To comprize the Parish of Wakefield and that part of the Parish of Brighton lying to the Southward of the Becaguinic Stream, and the Freeholders thereof shall assemble at the place commonly called Victoria Corner.

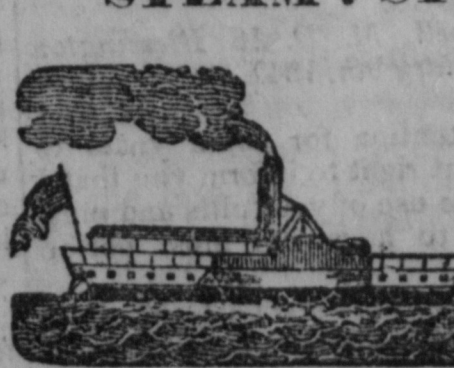
